

Not only this, but the burden of the huge armaments now maintained is clearly perceived to be one of the main causes of the present money stringency. Yet another is the enormous absorption of gold by India, which in 1912 amounted to nearly, if not quite, \$140,000,000, close on one-third of the total production, estimated at between \$465,000,000 and \$470.000.000.

These factors in international finance are strongly emphasized in a special article contributed by the Hon. George E. Roberts, director of the United States Mint, to Financial America of New York.
