

# What the Experts Say of Electric and Railway Purchases

## BUY THE SYSTEM, SAYS ARNOLD IF CONDITIONS ARE AMENDED SIR WILLIAM SAYS HE'S WILLING

Toronto Railway Company is Valued at Twenty-Two Million Dollars, and Toronto Electric Light Company at Six Millions—Many Benefits Would Accrue to the City as a Whole—Complete Details Presented to Council by Mayor Hocken.

Mayor Hocken's report to the city council yesterday on the valuation of the rapid transit and electric light and power properties is proof that the price asked by Sir William Mackenzie is not greater than the value. Sir J. Arnold, one of the valuers of the Toronto Railway Company property and other rapid transit properties and franchises in the city's limits, wrote as follows to Mayor Hocken:

"There are many arguments that can be made on both sides of the question of your city's acquiring the property under the conditions outlined, but, taking the most unfavorable view of it from the city's standpoint, the city is not paying an excessive amount over and above the real value of the property in order to possess itself of a clear right of way, both legal and physical."

Sir William Mackenzie's price is thirty million. The valuation of the property is so near to that amount as to, in the opinion of the valuers, justify the purchase.

Suburban Franchise.  
There are also to be considered the rights and franchises of the Toronto and Suburban Railway Company, which operates lines from O. P. E. tracks at Bathurst street along Davenport road into Ward Seven, small portions of line running to Weston and Lambton. Besides franchise rights which cover the whole of Ward Seven. At some time or other these ends of railways and franchises must be dealt with, if the City of Toronto is to have an adequate street railway system.

There was a further consideration in my mind in trying to put the transportation system of the city under public ownership, and it was to make it possible to admit the radial railways which might come to the borders of our city from any direction. I have been aware of this fact from the first, and it has been a factor in my mind at least three extensive radial railway systems, which proved futile because of the cost of the franchise, and it was impossible to secure an entrance to the heart of the city. With the system now operated by the Toronto Railway Company in its hands, the city, the way would be opened for the entrance of radial railways, whether constructed by private capital or by a union of municipalities.

Radial Railways.  
For twenty years past the advisability of extending radial railways to the centre of the city has been discussed almost continuously. The accomplishment of this desirable object has been prevented by the character of the franchise held by the Toronto Railway Company, and only by the acquisition of that franchise by the municipality can we succeed for the next eight years in bringing about this much desired end.

The aim with which I started was to get control of transportation only. I found that impossible. Sir William Mackenzie refused to separate the two properties, which have become intimately related since falling under one management. Nevertheless, under the condition I thought it wise to continue my negotiations to ascertain whether the feature of the franchise which carried out in the street, the citizens, carry out. "May I point out that in this computation no account is taken of the Toronto and Mimico division, which, under arbitration, has been determined to be worth something over \$15,000."

Nothing is allowed for the franchise value of the Toronto and Suburban Railway Company, which includes the Davenport Road line, portions of the Weston and Lambton lines, and the franchise which covers all West Toronto. Also, the intangible value of the Metropolitan Railway, which is based on the basis of its earnings, and absolutely without regard to the peculiarly favorable franchise which is held by the Toronto Railway Company over that portion of Yonge street within the city.

There are other elements of value which must be taken into account to reach a sound conclusion. For instance, the real estate of the Toronto and Suburban Railway is fixed at \$2,141,484.

I have asked Mr. Forman, the assessment commissioner, to give me an abstract of certain items of the real estate covering a period of eight years from this date. His reply to me, under date of September 11, is that the value of the real estate is not excessive, it would seem people of Toronto to acquire that system."

Turning to the report of Mr. R. A. Ross as to the value of the physical assets, we find that he gives the replacement value of this at \$8,353,960. Controller O'Neill followed up, and placed the present value at \$5,239,417, which is to be added to the value of the company's real estate, which is \$793,137, or a total value for the property of \$13,386,514, which leaves the sum of \$1,867,246 as the amount to be paid for the franchise and the business."

"Your motion to produce what is already tabled is irregular," said Controller McCarthy, who was presiding, to Controller Church.

"Throw it into the waste basket," Ald. Anderson suggested.

"I'm not going to be bull-dozed by Ald. McBrice or anyone else," Controller Church declared, getting heated.

Ald. Wickett appealed to council to give serious consideration to the fact that the city has not in its employ a man who has a knowledge of the strength of all building material, and a result Toronto is damaged by the use of certain building material now in much favor in other progressive cities."

He stated that Prof. Wright is an authority through Canada on strength of building material, as well as an expert on the subject of architecture.

Ald. Wickett declared that there was a foundation for the assertion that the World that he was playing war politics in supporting Mr. Price for the appointment of the city architect."

"There have been no convincing arguments that Mr. Price has the qualifications for city architect," Mayor Hocken said. "I would do anything within reason to advance Mr. Price's interests, but he has not the qualifications for city architect. The position requires a man of the qualifications of Prof. Wright. We have manufacturers who complain to us that they are penalized 10 or 15 per cent when building in Toronto, because our architect's department compels them to put in extra material that is not essential to the strength of the buildings. This tax on the manufacturer should not continue. Mr. Price

should be continued as assistant. Prof. Wright would be a big broad man for the position."

A motion to strike out the recommendation that Prof. Wright be appointed city architect was lost, and a motion to refer back the recommendation was carried. The division was as follows:
