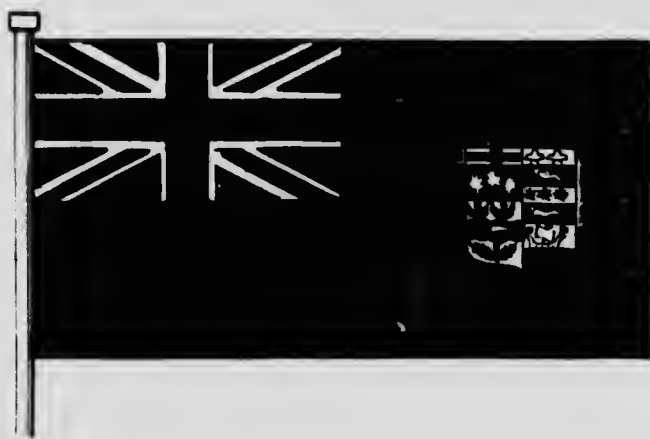


was placed above it. When the death of a prominent person occurred, the flag was lowered to make room for the conqueror—death. It is not necessary therefore, when placing a flag at half-mast, to lower it more than sufficient to allow space above it for another flag of the same size.

NOR is it a compliment to a nation to place the flag of another nation above it on the same staff.

A FLAG to have a good appearance should be in proportion to the height of the staff. Nothing is more unsightly in this respect than a very small flag on a very large staff.
