The singular thing is that some of the best work that Dickens ever did, better than the work in his best novels, can be found in these slight and composite scraps of journalism. For instance, the solemn and self-satisfied account of the duty and dignity of a waiter given in the opening chapter of bady's Luggage" is quite as full and fine as anything done anywhere by its author in the same vein of sumptuous satire.

It is G. K. C's delight to startle, waylay and alarm the casual reader; and he seldom fails to do it. One usually protests against the gathering together of every scrap of a famous author's writing after his death, but the practice would seem to be justified, if even so many-tomed a writer as Dickens is ronto has ever seen or ever will see still yielding up "some of the best work he ever did."

This interesting point arose in the prosecution in the afternoon police court yesterday, before Magistrate Kingsford, of Robert J. Siddell of 22 Sullivan-street, charged with the "of-tenes"

The magistrate said that there was doubt as to the interpretation of the clause of the Ontario Railway Act, which results:
"No passenger shall stand upon the side steps of any car for a greater length of time than is necessary to enable nim to enter or leave the car."

This, Magistrate Kingsford contended, would apply in the open summer cars, but not to the closed cars with seating up the side.

BARKEL EXPLODED Employes of Inland Revenue Depart-ment Had an Exciting Time.

OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—Sixteen employes of the analysts' and methylated spirits branches of the department of inland revenue, including two women, made wild dashes for safety about noon today, when a barrel, out of which was being pumped wood alcohol, exploded wit interrific noise and impact, overturning an electric motor and causing a dangerous fire to break out in the building, which was practically destroyed by fire, with heavy loss.

The total value of the stock of wood alcohol, grain alcohol, methylated spirite and other ingredients for its manufacture was about \$15,000.
