To Raise Exemption Age. The paragraph providing for an exemption of two hundred dollars for each child under sixteen years depending upon the tax payer caused a discussion.

Sir Thomas agreed to extend the exemption age of children from sixteen to eighteen years. Thus a man with a child of eighteen will have two hundred dollars exemption on that child.

Maharg Amendment Lost. Mr. J. A. Maharg moved, seconded by Mr. J. Johnston that the duty on plows and complete parts thereof be reduced two and a half per cent. to make it correspond with that on manure spreaders, weeders and cultivators.

STANDARD'S ASSETS NEED LONG NURSING

Liquidator Clarksons Says Shareholders Must Wait Years for Final Distribution. CREDITORS PROTECTED Nominal Surplus Six Hundred Thousand Dollars—Company's Offices Open Yesterday.

at the northeast corner of Victoria and Adelaide streets, and three stores adjoining to the Dominion government in connection with the plans for a new postoffice. The company obtained the better part of a million dollars by the transactions, and it was thought that its affairs had been put upon a firm basis.

There are approximately 2,320 shareholders registered on the lists of the Standard Reliance Mortgage Company, most of the sums ranging from \$20 to \$1,000, although there are some as high as \$6,000, but these are the number of smaller companies were incorporated with the Reliance Company from time to time, and these to the larger company were transferred.

The directors of the subsidiary Dovercourt Land & Savings Company consisted in 1918 of President A. H. Stevens, J. Williams, J. T. Gilmour and H. Waddington. Since then the place of Dr. Gilmour was taken by F. C. Jones, and Mr. Waddington has died.

The shareholders are few in number, and most of them residents of Toronto. They are: John Firstbrook, 42 Crescent avenue, 175; R. N. Johnston, K.C., 64 Belmont avenue, 47; F. C. L. Jones, 233 Balmain avenue, 47; Standard Reliance, 621; A. H. Stevens, Clitham, 177; H. Waddington, 75; A. J. Williams, 83 Oriole road, 359.

The last yearly report of the Dovercourt Company, dated December, 1918, showed the amount of capital authorized to be \$500,000, and the number of shares allotted is given at 8100 shares. There were no shares issued as fully paid up.

It was brought out by Mr. Clarksons and by E. F. Rathbun, who was acting managing director of the Standard Reliance, that the proceeds of the sale of Lawrence Park lots recently amounting to about \$250,000, reached only about one-third the amount it had been hoped to obtain.

The company's offices were open yesterday, but a notice posted up states that payments to depositors and debenture holders have been discontinued for the present.

Valuable Properties. Two important properties are owned by the Dovercourt Land Company. These are the Arcade at Nos. 131-33 37-39 Yonge street, with a total assessed valuation of \$694,000, and 82 acres of land on the west side of Yonge street, opposite Lawrence Park and north of Glenview avenue, assessed at \$247,140. The property at 82-88 East King street is assessed to the Standard Reliance Mortgage Corporation at a total of \$72,408. Nos. 10 and 12 East King street, at one time owned by the Standard Reliance or Dovercourt Land, are now assessed to the Royal Bank as owners, the total on land and buildings being \$399,187.

The company's buildings also include several farm properties in Whitby, one of which was designed to be laid out as a cemetery.
