## WHAT BROKE THE CABLE? WORKMEN GIVE EVIDENCE

Danger Was Appreciated, But for No Actual Reason—Jury Says It Was Defective

"That deceased came to his death in the City of Toronto on Dec. 1, 1935, as the result of an accident at the elevator used in the construction of the City Dairy stables on College-street, said accident being the result of a defective cable."

The above verdict was the result of the inquest before Coroner W. A. Young into the death of James E. Foreman, caused by the collapse of an elevator at the City Dairy's new stables on Friday last.

Alfred Wilds, engineer, said the hoist had worked perfectly since it was put up about a month ago and was used for carrying up cement and other building materials about two wheelbarrows full at a time. There never had been any repairs. "It was not for the purpose of carrying passengers."

Mr. Foreman made a practice of using it. It was against the engineer's will, because he felt nervous. There were danger signs on both sides of the hoist. When after time he had refused to use it, the foreman remarked some of the hoist men, the privilege of using the hoist.
