American intervention in Cuba for the purpose of putting a stop to a fiendish war by which the island is being devastated and its rich products are being lost to the human store, is in itself no more a violation of international right than the intervention of Great Britain and the other European powers in Crete. But if annexation is to follow, as misguided ambition evidently hopes, it will probably be the greatest mistake ever perpetrated by the United States. Jingolsm is the distemper of the age, and, while it is noxious to all who are infected, it would be supremely noxious to the American Republic.

The annexation of Hawaii may be said to The annexation of Hawaii may be said to have been virtually completed. It is not so serious a matter as the annexation of Cuba would be. But the best judgment of the United States is against it. It will constrain the United States to become a naval power, which at present thay have no need for being. It is not unlikely some day to bring them into collision with Japan, who, fired with the general passion, is providing herself with warships on a large scale. In all questions relating to naval policy and marfitme position Captain Mahan is now the oracle. He is a highly distinguished writer. But he has sea-power on the brain, and his theories do not to ordinary readers appear fully borne out by the history of war.

There are signs of a coming movement for the prohibition of tobacco. Enormous sums, we are told, are wasted on the noxious weed. If the weed is really noxious, lef it at once be laid aside. If more pleasure, or pleasure of a better kind, can be bought with the money, let this be done. But money spent on pleasure is not necessarily wasted. Pleasure is necessary, not only as a sweetener of life, but of character, which would turn sour without it. The more refined our pleasures can be no doubt the better for us. But a certain amount of physical pleasure appears necessary to balance physical exertion, whether of the hand or brain. Life might be supported on bread and water, but nobody would then look forward through his day's work to an enjoyable and cheerful meal. If medical science condemns the weed, its judgment is decisive. The mere fact that tobacco costs money which might be saved is not decisive. Ascetteism turned out at one door seems to be trying to get back through another. But entrance will be again refused by nature.
