NEW GATEWAY INTO MUSKOKA.

The Canada Atlantic Railway, under the Booth management, catered very little to the tourist traffic. Its principal business was in freight. Under the direction of its new owners, the road will become a highway for summer travel between the Great Lakes cities and the east. Passenger vessels are to run between Chubb, Duluth and other western points and Parry Sound, and the passengers will be conveyed from that point to Montreal, New York and Boston, via the New York Central and its allied lines. The railway will take them past the doors of the celebrated Muskoka lakes, and Muskoka will be extensively advertised as one of the features of this new tourist route. There is no doubt that Dr. Webb has in view the development of the highlands of Ontario in the same way that he has developed the Adirondack of New York State for the benefit of the New York Central. The Muskoka country is in many respects superior to anything that the New York Central people can offer the pleasure-seeking public of the United States. The beautiful lakes of Muskoka cannot be paralleled in any part of North America. The Vanderbilt lines have an immense patronage to draw from, and if they advertise the features of the Canada Atlantic Railway, they will doubtless draw a great traffic to the Muskoka country. Their new line passes thru Algonquin Park and the addition of a

few miles of track would bring the line to the Muskoka lakes. Hitherto Toronto has been practically the only gateway into the Muskoka country. Henceforth the entrance to the district for those coming from New York and the New England States, and, perhaps, from Chicago and western points, will be via the Canada Atlantic Railway. There is no reason to anticipate that Toronto will suffer by the changes that are about to take place. The only effect that will be produced will be to large increase in the number of visitors to Muskoka, and many of these who go in by the northern gateway will continue their journey southward thru Toronto to Niagara Falls, Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence. We know the opening up of this new entrance into Muskoka from the north will be of immense benefit to the whole province.

THE SCHOOL BOOK SWindle.

Premier Ross and his government will have a difficult task to convince the people of Ontario that they have not been overcharged for books supplied the pupils of the Public Schools by the Toronto publishing houses which control the trade. Evidence to establish excessive over-charging would not be difficult to procure. It is a well-known fact that the school book publishers who enjoy the confidence of the government have made fortunes out of the business. Those who have experience in the production of books are well aware that the books furnished the pupils of this province could be sold at a profit for about one-half the prices charged. The trade is in the hands of a ring, who retain the monopoly on the business by reason of alleged copyright privileges and by the connivance of the government. If the publishers of school books were thrown open to competition, the prices would be immediately lowered by from 25 to 50 per cent. The argument that copyright pieces are necessary for the abundance of selections that could be made from material which is forbidden by no copyright restrictions. We do not think that an investigation into the prices of school books would be any use at the present time, because we think the people are generally pretty well seized of the fact that the government has been allowing a ring of publishers to rob the public for the past 20 years. By the publishing of our school books, fortunes have been accumulated, and from this source the government has received not a little of the campaign funds that have helped keep it in power for many years. The school book fraud appeals to a large majority of the electorate. It will do deadly work against the Ross government at the coming election.
