A luncheon was held at Webb's at noon, with about seventy ardent supporters of the scheme in attendance. Lieut-Col. Mason was chairman and at his suggestion the matter of electing an honorary president was deferred, pending the receipt of a reply from a gentleman, name not disclosed, who has been communicated with in respect to his acceptance of the honor.

The constitution of the club was submitted and its provisions generally approved of. that a sailing vessel called the Raymond destined for the cod fishing industry off the Newfoundiand banks, has just been launched at St. Malo. Its owners hope that by the improvements introduced into the vessel they have solved the problem of providing a supply of bait, the obtaining of which has led to many difficulties and disputes between French and Newfoundland fishermen. The Raymond has been fitted with an ice-making machine, and a cold storage chamber, and it will carry from France a stock of bait sufficient to last a fishing campaign and to keep supplied 30,000 hooks, with which the Raymond's lines are fitted. With this invention the frequent journeys into port for bait will, it is hoped, be avoided, and a question solved which has often raised serious difficulties. EAST & CO., 300 YONGE ST
