GUSSIE FAILED AGAIN. On Board the Herald's Dispatch Boat Albert F. Dewey, off Havana, via Key squadron passed Cape Haytien yeste West, May 16.—The steamer Gussie day. made several unsuccessful attempts on Saturday to effect a landing on the Cuban coast in the vicinity of Havana. The Gussie, when sighted in the morning, was about two miles off Morro Castle. About 8:30 five shots were heard east of the entrance of the Mariel Bay, and the Gussie steamed close to shore, thinking it must be a signal from the insurgents, for whom she was to land arms.
