He dealt with the slanderous charges which have been made from time to time against the Liberal Government, and especially those charges made by Mr. Fowler, M. P., in the House, in which he insinuated certain things associated with "wine, wemen and graft." Mr. Aylesworth took occasion to point out certain things in regard to prominent Conservatives, past and present, and the minister's action met with the hearty approval of the Liberals assembled.

Hon. Mr. Aylesworth was given a reusing reception. He expressed the pleasure it gave him to meet so many of the good Liberals of South Huron, gathered together to select a candidate for the House of Commons. The large gathering was a good omen for success. (Cheers.)

ly injured. The passengers were placed on a special which was immediately sent out from Walkerville, and they were taken to Detroit as rapidly as possible, where they spent the day.

There were about 350 passengers on the train, 150 of whom were from Lon-

A wrecker from St. Thomas was at once sent out, but at 2:30 this afternoon the line had not been opened up. The cars are not badly smashed, but very difficult to replace them.
