Cuts Down Stable Staff and Gets Rid of Many Horses.

Berlin, July 1. - Emperor William, who owns horses enough to mount a cavalry regiment, has begun to economize in his stables and carriage houses. In Berlin alone he has 240 horses, and a staff of 800 men, including titled masters of the horse and stable-

He went to the equine department here one day and noticed a group of men loitering about without any particular object in view. He called one to him and asked what his duties were The man answered that he was head plaiter of the horses' manes.

"And how many assistants have you if you are the chief?" inquired the inquisitive Emperor. The man replied that his staff consisted of three men and two apprentices. "All engaged in plaiting manes?" asked his majesty. "You and your as-

sistants please take a month's notice and I shall be glad if you find a less exacting occupation." Then he called the master of the horse, and went into matters with this official, giving him a very bad quarter of an hour. In a few days the staff was
