#### Demise of an Old-Time London Man at Alden, Mich.

The following clipping from an Alden (Mich.) newspaper will be interesting to a large number of The Advertiser's readers. The subject of the sketch was for many years a resident of this city, and was in the grocery business, the store being at the corner of Hope and Colborne streets:

"Samuel Trotman was born in Wiltshire, England, on Feb. 27, 1833, and died at his residence north of town on Friday night, Oct. 14, 1898. In 1844 he moved with his parents from England to Western Ontario, Canada. On Nov. 26, 1856, he was married to Miss Christina Sincler. Two children were born to them, one son and one daughter. Mr. Trotman was converted in 1849, at the age of 16, and united with the M. E. Church of Canada. He came with his family to this place in 1879, where he resided until his death. His son died nearly ten years ago, and his wife about two years ago, so all that remains of the family now is the daughter, Miss Violet. Of his father's family there are yet remaining two brothers and one sister. Mr. Trotman was a man of considerable natural and acquired mental ability. He was a great reader and deep thinker. He was somewhat noted in these parts as a writer, both in prose and poetry. He also had a good deal of musical talent, and led a choir for ten years in the First M. E. Church of London, Ont. He had been in failing health for about two years, and seemed fully to realize his approaching end, and seemed to be prepared for it when it came. He stayed his mind upon the Lord, and seemed to have an exultant hope of the future.

"The funeral was held at the M. E. Church on Sunday, Oct. 16, the Rev. D. A. Green officiating. The church was filled, so that many were obliged to stand on the outside. The floral offerings were profuse and beautiful. remains were interred in the Alder cemetery."
