

## AGREEMENT MADE WHICH OBVIATES STRIKES ON RYS.

Railway Labor Board of Canada Is Duly Constituted.

MONTREAL, Aug. 7.—Not one car wheel in the two million which might one day carry Canada's goods to market over the Canadian railways, is likely hereafter to be stopped on account of railway labor troubles, according to a statement issued tonight from the offices of the Canadian Railway War Board. By an agreement signed this afternoon between the six great railway brotherhoods and the Canadian Railway War Board all railway labor disputes which cannot be settled between the men and the officers of the individual roads, whether regarding wages or working conditions, will be finally referred to the railway labor board of Canada.

This board consists now of six labor leaders, one for each of the brotherhoods, and six railway executives. Their decision on any matter referred to them will bind, on the one hand, the labor thus represented, and on the other hand the Canadian railways. In case of disagreement, the board will choose a referee, and if a referee cannot be agreed upon the governor-general-in-council, through the minister of railways and canals, will be asked to make the appointment. ## MONET'S JUDGMENT POINTS TO APPARENT DUPLICITY OF GOVT.

Justice Holds That Parliament Cannot Suspend Habeas Corpus.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—The judgment given out by Mr. Justice Monet of Montreal yesterday in the case of two habeas corpus applications taken on behalf of two individuals disfranchised at the last election, but nevertheless recently drafted for military service, has raised a new question. Not only does Judge Monet hold that even Parliament cannot suspend habeas corpus, but he holds that under the war-time election act the principle has been laid down that those to whom the franchise was specifically denied by reason of reason of nationality shall not be called upon to fight. For this reason writs were ordered by him to issue for the release of the two men.

In spite of the fact, however, they are said to be still in custody.

TO APPEAL MONET RULING. MONTREAL, Aug. 7.—Blansh and Strulovich, the two soldiers ordered liberated by Mr. Justice Monet on writs of habeas corpus yesterday, despite the recent ruling of the supreme court of Canada, have not been given their liberty yet, and are not likely to get it for some time.

There is a possibility that appeal may be taken from Mr. Justice Monet's judgment to the supreme court.

## 850 PEOPLE NEEDED TO SETTLE INTEREST ON VICTORY BONDS

820,000 Subscribers and 3,200 Banks Dealt With.

OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—Some interesting figures have been obtained from the department of finance in dealing with the amounts of work entailed in handling the first Victory Loan. In giving these out, Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, stated that he felt it should pay a tribute to the employees of the department who, from November to June, gave themselves unsparringly to the work.

The figures obtained from the department are as follows:

One million eight hundred thousand bonds and the same number of scrip certificates were issued. Each bond was countersigned.

## NINETEEN KILLED BY HURRICANE IN SOUTH LOUISIANA

LAKE CHARLES, La., Aug. 7.—Nineteen persons killed, twenty injured, some probably fatally, Gerstner aviation field, near here, virtually demolished, and other property damage, estimated at thousands of dollars, is the toll of a tropical hurricane which struck Southwestern Louisiana yesterday, according to information that reached here tonight from the storm-swept district. It was reported nearly all of the hangars had been razed and many airplanes either destroyed or blown away completely.

## HEAT FORCES MEN TO QUIT WORK

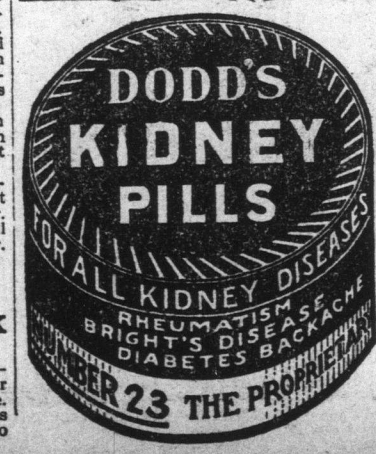
