KING AND QUEEN OF BELGIUM VISIT NIAGARA FALLS REDS AND SOX READY FOR FIFTH BASEBALL BATTLE TODAY

RUNAWAY FREIGHT CAR RACES THROUGH STATION AT 30 MILES AN HOUR, BUT DOES NO DAMAGE

Hand Brakes Failed To Work in Spite of Brakeman's Best Efforts—Yard Engine Unable To Catch Up With the Speeder.

A runaway freight car, speeding through the city at 30 miles an hour, with a yard engine and a passenger train in pursuit, was the scene of a dramatic race today. The runaway car, which was loaded with coal, was seen by a yard engine driver at the station. He immediately sounded the alarm, and the yard engine started to move. The runaway car, however, was moving so fast that the yard engine was unable to catch up with it. The car continued to race through the city, and the yard engine followed it for several blocks. The car finally stopped at a crossing, where it was caught by the yard engine. The car was damaged, but no one was hurt.

NEITHER SIDE CAN CLAIM A VICTORY IN BRITISH STRIKE

British Newspapers Take This View Regarding End of Trouble.

"CLEAN SETTLEMENT"

Both Parties Come In For a Certain Amount of Criticism.

ALL TRAINS RUNNING. London, Oct. 6.—Great Britain's railway system was again in operation today as the result of the settlement yesterday of the great railway strike, averting what threatened to be a serious spread of anation labor troubles. Virtually every man engaged in railway work returned to his duty at 6 o'clock this morning. The various railroads were in operation, and the country was relieved of the strain of the strike.

London, Oct. 6.—General relief and satisfaction is expressed by the newspapers over the settlement of the railway strike. A majority of the journals maintain that neither side is entitled to claim a victory, but that the settlement is a "clean settlement." The Telegraph is satisfied with the "clean settlement," and hopes the strike has "proved finally that an attempt by railwaymen to stun the nation will always fail."

The Mail declines to discuss the terms and says: "If they satisfy the railwaymen they will satisfy everybody." It adds: "Although it has been a costly lesson, it has been demonstrated that a strike, when resolutely faced, must fail."

The Chronicle contends the strike ended "without a full realization of the catastrophe, due mainly to the personal conduct of Premier Lloyd George and those labor leaders who realized in time that the country was disgusted." It declares the strike a failure.

U. S. EMBARGO AGAINST SHIPPING TO BRITAIN IS PARTIALLY LIFTED

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—The embargo against the sailing of shipping board vessels to Great Britain, partially lifted today by the shipping board as a result of the ending of the railroad strike there.

"LEFTY" WILLIAMS OR "BIG BILL" JAMES TO PITCH FOR CHICAGO

Cincinnati's Manager To Put Eller or Reuther in Box.

SOX ARE STILL CONFIDENT

Backers of Gleason's Team Asking Odds From Cincinnati's Fans.

GOOD WEATHER PROMISED.
Chicago, Oct. 6.—The weather this morning was clear and cool, indicating that the fifth game of the world series would be played this afternoon. The forecast for the day is "Fair, with moderate temperature."

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Victorious in three of the first four world series games, the Cincinnati Reds were out today to bag the fifth contest of the series, postponed yesterday, when a downpour of rain, setting in late Saturday night, soaked Comiskey Field to such an extent that playing was impossible.

Pitching selections for the game this afternoon were uncertain, but so far as the Reds were concerned, the choice was to be Claude ("Lefty") Williams, who had pitched in the second game of the series at Cincinnati. Williams, it was figured, had had enough rest since he went to the mound in the first game. But it is possible that Gleason may make a last minute switch in the plans and send "Big Bill" James into the fray in an effort to stop the Reds.

Attempt Is Made To Dynamite Plant of Dominion Textiles

Hole Nearly Three Feet Square Is Blown in Wall.

Montreal, Oct. 6.—An attempt to dynamite the plant of the Dominion Textile Company, 1545 St. Patrick street, Cote St. Paul, was reported to the police and the detectives late Saturday night. A hole three feet square had been blown in the east wall of the building and nearly all the windows in the building were shattered. It is thought that the attempt was made by a stick of dynamite placed on the sill of one of the rear windows.

PLUMBERS RECEIVE INCREASE IN SCALE

Western Reeve Is Compelled To Salute British Flag and Sing "God Save the King"

P. M. Friesen of Rush Lake Arouses Indignation of Crowd At Swift Current When He Refuses To Show Loyalty During Reception of Prince of Wales.

Swift Current, Sask., Oct. 5.—A southwestern town, with a population of 1,500, was the scene of an exciting episode yesterday when a crowd of 2,000 people gathered to receive the Prince of Wales. The town was divided into two camps, the one for the Prince and the other for the local reeve, P. M. Friesen. Friesen, who is a member of the local council, refused to show loyalty to the Prince of Wales during the reception. He refused to sing "God Save the King" and to salute the British flag. This act aroused the indignation of the crowd, and Friesen was forced to leave the town.

Where does he stand? Is he a Conservative, a Liberal or an Independent? I want to know these things before I support him."

Close on Ald. Wilson's heels came others. Dr. E. W. Shaw among them. It is said, who supported this demand for information. None, however, was forthcoming from the supporters of Sir Adam, who endeavored to soothe the ruffled feelings of the want-to-know members.

DUKE OF AOSTA WILL APPEAL TO D'ANNUNZIO

Sixty bodies have been recovered, but these are believed to be a very small fraction of the aggregate of dead.

BEELIUM'S KING AND QUEEN IN VISIT TO CANADA, PERSONALLY CONVEY GRATITUDE OF NATION

Government Representatives Welcome Heroic Soldier King At Niagara Falls—King Albert Extends Thanks to Canadian People For Assistance to His Subjects—Was At Falls in His Youth.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Oct. 6.—To convey personally to the people of Canada the gratitude of the Belgian nation for the gallant defence made by Canada's soldiers at Ypres, and the brilliant victory of the second battle of Ypres, the soldier-king of Belgium, with his equally heroic queen, Elizabeth, and their fighting son and heir-apparent, Prince Leopold, crossed the upper bridge from the United States, and spent about an hour on Canadian soil today. It was really an informal visit. The Canadian Government was notified on Sunday of the intention of his royal highness to cross to the Canadian side. There were no formal speeches.
