

Fireman Saved Ten Lives. DENVER, Col., Sept. 8.—Five men lost their lives and a score of persons were injured, several of them seriously, in a fire that gutted the Belmont Hotel, a three-storey building, this morning. Patrick Treadwell, a fireman, of Cripple Creek, Col., who was sleeping in the Belmont, when the fire started, is credited with having saved at least ten lives by inducing entrapped guests to jump from the upper storey win-dows across a five-foot alley to the roof of an adjoining building and
