MAY HANG CASEMENT WITH A SILKEN ROPE

But He May Escape Extreme Penalty on Ground of Insanity.

LONDON, May 4.—Sir Roger Casement will be brought to trial in London within a few days on the charge of high treason. It was announced to-day, following the execution of rebel leaders yesterday morning.
Baron Reading, lord chief justice of England, will preside. Unless Sir Roger escapes death sentence because he is found to be insane he will be hanged with a silken rope—a "privilege" accorded condemned members of the nobility by ancient custom.
Casement is not "a member of the nobility."

He'll Refuse to Pay School Taxes in Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 4.—At a meeting of bilingual supporters here last night, Senator Belcourt announced that he would be one of those who would refuse to pay school taxes until the French-Canadians of Ontario get "justice" from the government.

FORMER U. S. DIPLOMAT WAS TAKEN IN DUBLIN

James M. Sullivan Was Recently Minister to San Domingo.

PRISONER IN ENGLAND

Ambassador Page Making Inquiries as to Cause of Detention.

LONDON, May 4.—James M. Sullivan, of New York, until a few months ago American minister to San Domingo, has been arrested at Dublin in connection with the rebellion.
American Ambassador Page today made inquiries at the foreign office concerning Sullivan's arrest.
Sullivan has been brought to England. Mr. Page asked what charge has been preferred against him, and what procedure will be taken.

His Career.

James Mark Sullivan, former American minister to Santo Domingo, was born in Killarney, Ireland, Jan. 6, 1872, but came to America when a child. He was educated at Yale, and practised law in Connecticut, later coming to New York, where he practised law from 1906 to 1913.
Sullivan was named U. S. minister to Santo Domingo through the influence of Secretary of State Bryan on Aug. 12, 1913. Charges were made against him about eighteen months ago, and an investigation was conducted in New York of his alleged friendliness for a firm of contractors and certain banking institutions on the island.
Sailed last July.
Mr. Sullivan sailed from New York last July for Liverpool, with his wife and son, saying that he was going to Limerick, Ireland, to visit his mother. He said he expected to be back in New York by Sept. 1.
Shortly before he sailed, Mr. Sullivan was virtually asked to resign his post as minister to the Dominican Republic as the result of an investigation conducted by a commission. It was understood the report censured Mr. Sullivan for indiscretions in the conduct of his office.
Mr. Sullivan was lawyer and press agent for "Bald Jack" Rose in the notorious Rosenthal case, for which Lieut. Chas. Becker was electrocuted.

BITTER PROTEST SENT BY IRISH-AMERICANS

Speedy Execution of Pearce and Associates Termed "Savage Repression."

NEW YORK, May 4.—According to newspapers here, the speedy action of the English authorities in trying and executing four of the leaders of the Irish Republic yesterday was a surprise to the Irishmen in this country, after the collapse of the movement, hoped some might be found to save the lives of the leaders.
The fact that the three other signers of the proclamation of the new "Republic" were given only three years was taken to mean that the several hundred Irishmen who took part in the revolution may escape with even lighter sentences.
Following a meeting of leading supporters of the Irish Parliamentary party in New York last night, a telegram was sent to John E. Redmond, M.P., which reads:
"Irish in America, contrasting the execution of Dublin leaders with treatment in Ulster and South Africa, are revolted by this sign of repression."
It was signed by Capt. Stephen McParlane, president of the New York Municipal Council of the United Irish League.

"THE O'REILLY" SHOT IN DUBLIN FIGHTING

One of Rebel Leaders Reported Killed in Effort to Escape.

LONDON, May 4.—The O'Reilly, one of the rebel leaders, is believed to have been shot while attempting to escape from the Dublin postoffice, according to the Dublin correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company, who, telegraphing on Wednesday, says that O'Reilly's body was found in Moore Lane, near the post-office building.
There were some disturbances in the southwest of Ireland on Tuesday, in which some casualties occurred.

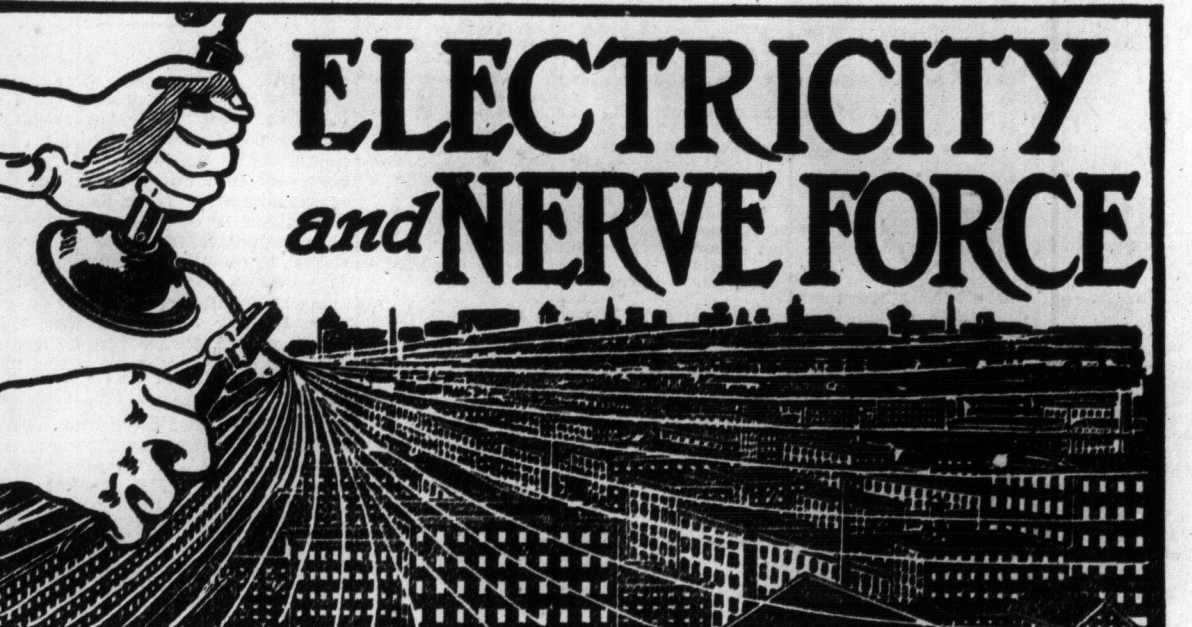

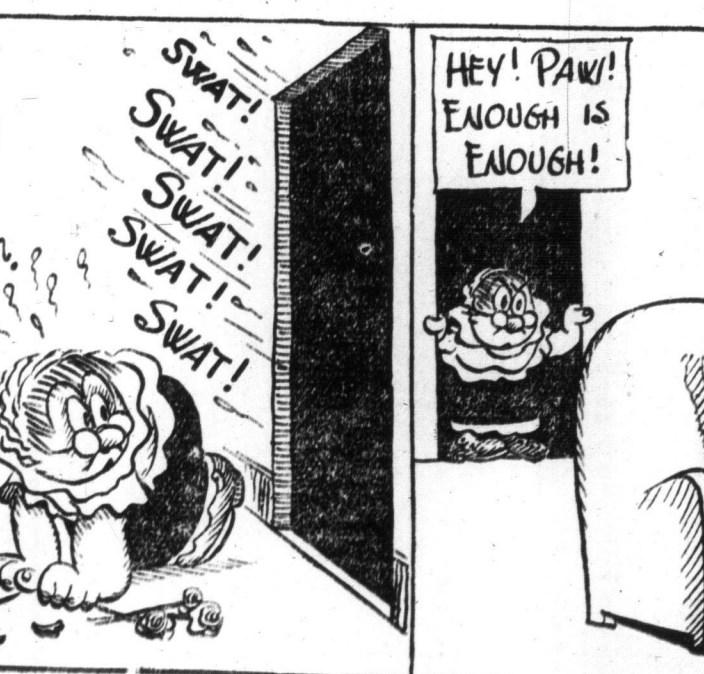
