RATEPAYERS TO BEAR SEWAGE SYSTEM COST

The Coxwell drainage system to sewer the district north of Danforth avenue and between Monarch Park avenue and 400 feet east, was authorized by council at a cost of \$46,167, the entire cost to be borne by the ratepayers.

SOON START BUILDING NEW NURSES' RESIDENCE

The local board of health got the assurance of Commissioner Harris yesterday that the water main which crosses the site of the proposed home, at the corner of Broadview and Gerrard streets, would be removed in time to permit a start on the construction of the building within a month from the present.

The main had just been laid and the expense of removing it to another location will be charged up against the cost of the building. The estimated cost of the building is \$350,000.

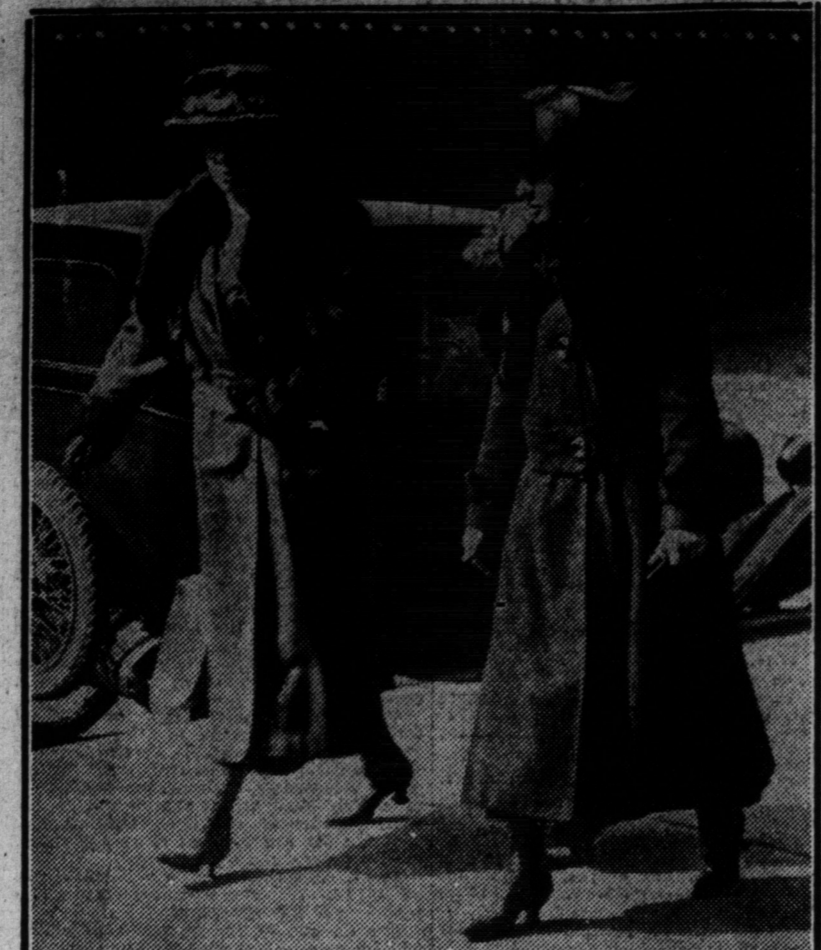

SAYS DOUGHTY HAD ATTORNEY POWER

(Continued From Page 1.) was not Doughty's intention to smash and not Small, and are you not trying to do it again now?" To which question the witness answered a humble and simple "no."

When John Doughty entered the court at 10.30 a.m. it was crowded in every corner, but the officials had made excellent arrangements to prevent any discomfort to those persons having business there.

Doughty looked particularly well, and, as sporting men say, "in the pink of condition." He entered stay down by the Don is evidently doing him a lot of good.

Nothing in malice and did not plead "for blood." He just gave plain facts. After A. T. Timmins, a stockbroker, had given evidence as to the sale of Victory bonds to the missing millionaire and Mr. Hellmuth had pointed out that no coupons had been clipped from the bonds for over a year, Thomas Joyce, assistant manager to the Dominion Bank, gave evidence that on Dec. 1 deposits had been made to Mr. Small's account of \$127.50 and \$65.35, which would represent the December interest on the bonds. The deposit slip had, however, been lost.

F. Miller, the head keeper of the Dominion safety deposit vaults, said that the number of Small's vault at the bank was 1584, and Doughty's, 2860. He declared that on Dec. 1 Doughty had been at Small's box from 2.38 to 2.48 p.m. and on Dec. 2 from 8.59 to 10.02 a.m. He had every right, declared Mr. Miller, to go to Small's box, as Mr. Small had given Doughty a power of attorney to open the safe at any time. On May 6 Miss Jean Doughty, the prisoner's sister, brought a letter and a card, dated Dec. 2, 1919, to witness, explaining that she wished his sister to give a half share in the box. It was explained later that the card had been given by witness to Doughty previous to Dec. 2, 1919, and that Doughty had verbally informed him of the arrangement.

In reply to Mr. Hellmuth, the witness said that Small had a large box, and Doughty had a smaller one, and it would be impossible to put the alleged stolen bonds into the latter's box, the funds was too large.

Mrs. Atabrose Small, the wife of the missing millionaire, was really the best witness of the day. She testified in a low, clear voice and deposed that she had seen her husband all her visits about her, and once, when counsel made a slip mentioning the name of her husband, she said: "When being cross-examined by Mr. Hellmuth, she at times appeared over anxious to explain certain matters, but, notwithstanding, she answered all-around questions, she came out well thru the ordeal."

In reply to Mr. Greer, Mrs. Small traced the husband's movements from Dec. 2—about 8.30 p.m.—the whole of which evidence has been already reported. She said that on Monday, Dec. 1, her husband, from his home, told him to go to the vaults and bring bonds to the value of \$100,000 to the office of Messrs. Oser, his solicitors. This the prisoner did. Her husband gave her the bonds and she had them now. On Dec. 2, as her husband had not returned by 7.30 p.m., she telephoned to the theatre, but received no reply. About 8.30 p.m., she phoned Doughty at his Beach house and he told her that her husband had left for the vaults at 5.30 p.m., and that he (Doughty) was going to Montreal that night when she sent for him to come and see her. She asked him, as she understood that he was the last man to see her husband, "What took him? Did he seem to be in? Did he seem to be a usual? Did he seem to lose his memory?" Doughty replied that Mr. Small seemed to be very nervous and had dictated letters to the vaults, and he said that he had returned it to her husband.

The trial continued until 11.30 p.m. when it was adjourned until 10.30 a.m. tomorrow.

Key of Deposit Safe. In cross-examination, Mrs. Small traced the husband's movements and she...

After facing with counsel for some time, Mrs. Small acknowledged that her husband called Doughty "Jack," and that they were familiar together, and that Mr. Hellmuth tried to get an acknowledgment from Mrs. Small that she was aware that Doughty had under the power-of-attorney, just as much right to open Small's safety box as had the owner himself.

Mr. Hellmuth sternly said: "This man is on trial for the theft of \$105,000, and I am not going to let anyone say that he has a right to open Small's safety box, so you may as well make up your mind to it, Mrs. Small."

To this Mrs. Small replied that Doughty was a friend of hers, and that Mr. Hellmuth testified that Mrs. Small was not above telephoning to this "servant" when she wanted any assistance.

In reply to further questions, Mrs. Small said she did not think that she had phoned to Doughty on other occasions excepting Dec. 2, but when pressed would not swear to it.

Mrs. Small said that the \$100,000 was given to her by her husband to be used for charitable purposes.

Have you \$100,000 in your private safety vault? Yes.

Witness went on to explain that her husband had arranged to help her to distribute the capital, but up to the present she had only given away the interest.

Mrs. Small declared that her husband was worth one and a half million dollars, and that there was a will in existence, dated 1903, leaving everything to her.

Fred T. Daville, program printer, repeated his evidence given in the police court, but materially added to it, which led to continued protests from Mr. Hellmuth. He declared that such evidence was an attempt to prejudice the jury in a most unjust way.

The evidence given would warrant an indictment for murder.

GOT LAND FOR SONG ON KING AND YONGE

Teachers Hear Interesting Lecture on the Early Days of Toronto.

BUILT CHEAP CHURCHES

Investor Had Property Bargain, Erecting Hardware and General Store.

Public and high school teachers turned out in great force yesterday afternoon to attend an address given to the profession in Foresters' Hall, College street.

Rare scenes which now only exist as photographic pictures, served to reconstruct the town from its inception under Governor Simcoe until today.

Under Governor Simcoe the real birthplace of the city was on the bay at the foot of Bathurst street.

A few log cabins were situated at this point and it was there that the old fort was built, much of which stands today.

From there the village proper, lifted to the foot of Parliament street, which is so named because of the fact that the first parliament buildings were situated there.

The lecturer took several minutes to show by slides what he termed the evolution of King and Yonge. It was originally the scene of the old Dennis farm.

An American, however, who was termed crazy at the time because of his extravagance, paid Dennis \$6 an acre for the King and Yonge property on which he erected a hardware and general store.

Later with the growth of the city bigger buildings were erected until today it is the scene of the latest skyscrapers in the British empire.

Days of Many Saloons. Mr. Jackson traced the history of the city thru its growth in population, business and finance and showed how the first bank, known as the Bank of Upper Canada, came to be started at the corner of King and Frederick streets.

The attack upon the town by the Americans under General Dearborne was also recalled as were reminiscences of William Lyon Mackenzie, Bishop Strachan, and the celebrated row at Montgomery's Tavern on upper Yonge street which ended in Mackenzie's fight.

Prohibition did not count for very much in those days, as was evident by the fact that along King street, east of Yonge, virtually every corner boasted a saloon.

UNEMPLOYED ARMY AGAIN AUGMENTED

Work Outside of Farming is Still Scarce—Registration Numbers Grow.

Toronto's army of unemployed continues to swell and during the past week has been augmented by the addition of 348 men, the total number out of work now standing at 18,747, according to official figures.

The workless include 8604 returned soldiers and 10,138 civilians. The married men number 9299 and the single 8818.

Supt. Miller of the government employment bureau stated to "The World" yesterday that, with the exception of the demand for farm help, there was no work of any kind now being offered and the unemployment situation was at a standstill.

The registrations at the employment bureau yesterday numbered 920, which 234 were new additions to the ranks of the unemployed.

Relief applications at the Krausman were just over the 2000 mark yesterday, including 30 new cases.
