Orders in the Diocese shall have a thorough Theological raining, to fit them for the several duties of the Ministry; and

Whereas there is no Institution within the Diocese

wherein such training can be received in conformity with he doctrine and discipline of the Church of England; and Whereas the Governors of King's College, Windsor, Nova Scotia, did unanimously on the 20th day of October last ass a resolution to apply to the Legislature to amend the ct of Incorporation of the said College so that the Bishop of Fredericton shall be one of the twelve Governors ex officio, as shall give the Bishop of Fredericton joint powers with he Bishop of Nova Scotia in the nomination of any future rofessor or Professors of Divinity; therefore

Resolved, That King's College, Windsor, in the Diocese Nova Scotia, shall be considered on and after the proosed legislation shall have been made, as the Theologil School of the Diocese of Fredericton until one shall e established therein; and that his Lordship do recomend the same to Candidates seeking Holy Orders; and at his Lordship be respectfully requested, with the conent of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in oreign Parts, to apply the Scholarships placed at his dissal to assist such Candidates as he may think fit, on contion that such Candidates do receive Holy Orders in this iocese, and remain in the same not less than three years: being understood that he shall be at liberty, should he e fit, to retain any of them for theological instruction thin his own Diocese, under his own superintendence, ring the period of preparation for Holy Orders.

Whereupon, the Rev. G. G. Roberts moved, and Mr. W. arman seconded the following amendment:

That it would be more conducive to the best interests of is Diocese to establish as soon as possible, a Theological rofessorship or School at Fredericton, in connection with a University of New Brunswick, in order that Divinity udents may be educated under the direct supervision and fluence of our own Bishop, and in sympathy of feeling d associations with our own Diocese.
