Gold by Percy LeFroy, alias Mapleton, occurred June 27, 1881, has again been the scene of a mysterious tragedy, the details of which so far as ascertained are markedly similar to that of a quarter of a century ago.

BIG REFUNDS TO BE MADE TO WOOD PULP IMPORTERS

United States Government Has Decided to Drop Its Contention That This Material Exported There from Canada Should Pay Extra Duty.

The United States has concluded to drop its contention that an additional duty should be levied on wood pulp, the product of pulp wood cut from crown lands and private lands in the province of Quebec.
