Amid the strain and uproar of war, people are likely to lose sight of some of the big things in the way of peacetime achievements. Among these is New York's completion of its \$140,000,000 Catskill aqueduct.

If ever there was a city that needed an improvement in the quality of its drinking water, it is New York. And now is the accepted time, in view of the soaring prices of other liquids. The new aqueduct is 120 miles long; it conducts water under the Hudson River through a siphon which at one point is 1,114 feet below the surface of the East River, carries water to the people of Brooklyn. The work was begun twelve years ago and has been continued practically without cessation.

According to some authorities, the Catskill enterprise ranks next to the Panama Canal among the works of American engineers. The work involved the construction of tremendous dams and the destruction of whole villages and forests to provide a drainage shed free from contamination.

MENU FOR SUNDAY.

Breakfast.

Creamed Beets:—
Cook beets until tender. Skin and chop into quarter inch cubes. Make a white sauce. Season. Add the beets and reheat.

Peel, core and cut into slices pear not too ripe. To four pounds pears use four pounds sugar and a half cup of water. Add juice of two lemons and rind cut thin. THE WOMEN WHO ARE ENTITLED TO VOTE

(Ottawa Journal-Press)

Women from the Old Country living in Canada who have relatives serving with the British or Canadian armies are entitled to vote in the coming general election, even though those relatives have never been in Canada.

The mother, sister, or daughter of a nurse serving outside Canada is also entitled to vote.

As there is much doubt, even among the enumerators, as to just what women are entitled to be placed on the voters' list, The Journal has secured a statement from an authoritative source. Women who can qualify should insist upon the enumerator enrolling them, and if he refuses or should not turn up before Nov. 27, send their name and address to The Journal.

The following are the necessary qualifications, and the enumerators should place upon the voters' list every woman who:—

(1) Is a British subject by birth or naturalization.

(2) Is twenty-one years of age.

(3) Has resided in Ontario for one year prior to the writ of election.

(4) Has resided and is domiciled in the electoral district (Ottawa) for thirty days prior to the writ of election.

(5) Is the wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter of any person male or female, living or dead, who is serving or has served without Canada in any of the military forces of Canada or of Great Britain or within or without Canada in any of the naval forces of Canada or of Great Britain, in the present war (but not those members of the naval forces of Canada who are engaged with the British or Canadian military or naval forces should have ever been in Canada. It is sufficient if his or her female relatives live in Canada.

But the above mentioned female relatives shall not be entitled to be placed on the voters' list or to vote if the person who has served in the army or navy and through whom they claim to vote is no longer serving as above mentioned unless such person has died, in or has been honorably discharged from service.

If a woman is qualified as above she is entitled to be placed on the voters' list and to vote, although she is within the class of naturalized enemy aliens.

Soldiers' Votes.
Soldiers who are twenty years of age and under are entitled to the same voting privileges in the coming elections as those twenty-one, and over, provided they are on active service outside of Canada. This is the interpretation placed upon the Military Voters' Act by W. F. O'Connor, of the Department of Justice. Female relatives of such soldiers have no vote unless the soldier is out of Canada and on active military service.

CANADA'S MAIMED FARE BETTER THAN ALLIES

England and France Cannot Give Disabled Men the Thorough Training Dominion Offers

Canada is doing more today to rehabilitate her soldiers industrially than any country in the world, according to the correspondence between the Military Hospitals Commission to which this work is entrusted in the dominion, and the organizations in England and France engaged in the work of healing and reeducating maimed soldiers.

In France and England only four out of every hundred soldiers discharged as unfit are estimated to need instruction in new trades to enable them to carry on, whereas in Canada ten per cent of

the disabled men are being granted this advantage.

The Length of Course.

The course which Canada gives a man in a new trade is governed in length by his need. Sometimes it is six months, sometimes eight, and in exceptional cases even a year. In France the course is limited to three months. There is no over-intensity of effort brought on by pressure in Canada. The hard pushed Frenchmen appreciating the fact that this is the last chance which a struggling country burdened with difficulty can give them, must strain every nerve.

The Canadian is expected to be industrious, but the course is usually started before his convalescence is completed, and he is given time to acquire the new knowledge under normal conditions. His mind is freed from worry for the work, since the government maintains him and his family during the required period, and there is no danger to his newly regained health.

The Canadian soldier realizes that his

endeavor to acquire a trade which will make him independent will not decrease his pension. He knows that his pension, fixed before he undertook his course by the measure of his disability at that time, will not be reduced in any way. In England the pension is fixed after he has been re-educated.

In France and England only bed patients are given training in hand crafts, as occupational treatment, but in Canada every convalescent soldier is given opportunity to take some vocational course in order that he may improve himself and gradually ease into civilian life and routine.
