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WINSTON CHURCHILL AND BONAR LAW SPEAK OF OUTRAGE

Cannot Convey All Mail and Passenger Ships—What Will United States Do?

London, May 10.—Rt. Hon. Winston Spencer Churchill said in the House of Commons today that a board of trade inquiry will be held in the Lusitania matter.

He said that it is premature to discuss the matter, but that it must be possible to make the naval dispositions for patrolling our coast.

Our enemies have reached a degree of infamy which is simply hopeless to attempt to conceal, said Andrew Bonar Law today at the presentation of a medal to Captain Bell of the British steamship Thorold, which rammed a German submarine in February.

This is not an act of warfare, he continued, "it is simply murder, most foul, most unnatural."

Saying that up to the present no effective protest has been made by any neutral country, he added: "What will happen now? The great proud nation, the United States, is the country most closely affected by this latest outrage. I feel sure the United States will be guided not merely by the monetary interests of the country, but by feelings as to what is due to a great nation, among other nations of the world."

THE FIRE RECORD Pittsburgh, May 10.—Five persons were burned to death and two were seriously injured when fire early today destroyed an Italian tenement house.

Three Rivers, Que., May 10.—Fire yesterday in the hardware store of Cyrille Labadie & Co., de la Forge street, and adjoining buildings did damage estimated at \$30,000.

Quebec, Que., May 10.—Fire about midnight in the general store of Louis Boly, at Millstream, a suburb of Chateaufort, destroyed the building, also the residence of Joseph Deperre and of Alphonse Bilodeau. The damage is placed at \$12,000, partly covered by insurance.

Edmonton, Alb., May 10.—Henry Meyer, aged fifty, and her two sons, Henry and Conrad, are charged with the murder of Henry Meyer, husband and father of the family, Reinhardt Meyer, a young child of about three years, and two other brothers took their father from the house into the cow stable and hanged him.

NOT IN COURT About fifty Bulgarians appeared in the police court this morning to testify against an employe of the Courtenay Bay Construction Company, who they allege extracted unlawfully \$80 from each of them. The defendant did not appear and it was stated that he had gone to the United States.

The Wheat Market. Chicago, May 10.—Unusual nervousness and rapid changes in price today characterized the wheat market. After opening 1-3-8 lower to 8-8 higher, prices advanced well above Saturday's level all around but later suffered a material general decline.
