Auction Of Goods Owned By German Tars Recalls War

Property of Sailors Left When
They Were Called to
Serve.

Honolulu, Aug. 16.—(A. P. by mail.)—Memories of the World War were revived here recently with the opening and official sale of trunks, boxes and bags of German sailors who were called from merchant ships here to serve aboard the German cruiser Nürnberg, which sailed from this port shortly after the declaration of war by Germany. The cruiser went down with all hands in the battle off the Falkland Islands on December 8, 1914.

When the German sailors, all naval reservists, left Germany aboard their various vessels—the Pommer, Setos, Prins Waldemar, Holstia and others—they carried with them pictures of home groups and many trinkets, which came to light when the luggage was opened preparatory to auctioning off the contents. The bags also contained mementoes of many far lands—Java, India, the Straits Settlement, China, New Guinea and Borneo.

When Germany declared war nearly all of the German merchantmen in the Pacific hastened toward Honolulu for safety. The cruiser Nürnberg, pursued by British and Japanese vessels, put in for coal and supplies. There was need for haste and all of the reservists aboard the merchantmen were transferred to the Nürnberg. The men could take only a small portion of their effects with them. The remainder was placed in the trunks, boxes and bags, which were taken in charge by the Collector of Customs when the United States declared war on Germany.

For six years the effects have been in the Custom House. Recently, as the result of correspondence between the German Ambassador at Washington and the State Department, permission was granted to auction off the luggage and to return the purely personal effects, such as pictures, letters and trinkets that represent human interest, to the German Consul at San Francisco, who will forward them to the families of the men in Germany. The receipts from the auction of clothes and other articles will be sent to the families, also. The prohibitive price of freight, which would have to be paid in German marks, prevents the dispatch of all of the articles to the German families.

The bags yielded many interesting objects—rare linens, beautiful ostrich and other feathers, a Luger pistol loaded and ready to fire, several sextants, and other navigation equipment, and many books.

Would Jail Reckless Motor Car Drivers

Toronto, Sept. 14.—The need for drastic steps to be taken to stop the ever growing number of accidents caused by automobiles was the keynote of the address made by Judge Coatsworth to the Grand Jury at the opening of the general session of the peace for the county of York.

"I think that 95 per cent. of the people who drive cars are reasonably careful and cautious and do their best to avoid accidents," he said. "The other five per cent., or it may be less than five per cent., are the cause of all the trouble and are continually being brought into court."

"These men should be sent to jail. The time has come when the public will expect us to protect them against the ever increasing number of those accidents. I think the only remedy is to send the offenders to jail. In addition we ought to have a power to suspend their licenses and forbid them to drive for a certain number of years."

TAX APPEALS AT CITY HALL

Three tax appeals were heard by the city council yesterday afternoon but final action was not taken on any of them. W. E. Golding objected to the valuation placed on his property at Indiantown. Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., who appeared for Mr. Golding, said his client was quite willing to hand over the property to the city for the mortgage of \$3,000 and this year's taxes of \$900 and it was valued by the assessors at \$10,000, which valuation Mr. Golding contended was absurd.

Commissioner Frink asked if other properties in the vicinity were assessed on the same basis and the chairman of the Board of Assessors said they were. G. H. V. Belyea, for the Imperial Oil Co., appealed for an abatement of \$15,000 or at least \$9,000, which they said they were over assessed by error in the office of the assessors, that amount having been added twice. The chairman of the Board said he would look into the claim of a clerical error and if it was found would make the correction in the valuation.

M. G. Teed, K. C., for the McLaughlin Motor Car Co., asked that their valuation of \$44,000 on real estate be reduced to \$35,000 and that the assessment on \$16,000 on income be eliminated as they had made no income during 1922.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., city solicitor, asked if the statement filed by them would not be accepted by the assessors and Mr. McAlary, manager of the company said they had not. Mr. Olive, chairman of Assessors said such notice had been given over the telephone.

The city solicitor suggested that a chartered accountant be secured to go over the books of the company and that further action be deferred until this had been done. Mayor Fisher was given authority to engage an accountant for this purpose.

CHEAP LOOKING BAGGAGE ADVISED FOR AMERICANS

Cologne, Aug. 25.—(By mail.)—If Americans would carry less expensive-looking baggage they would not have so much of it stolen, was the advice a Cologne baggage-smasher gave to a New York woman who was bewailing the loss of a suitcase which contained her passport and travelers' checks.

"Leave all your high-priced bags and cases and boxes at home when you come to Europe," the baggage-smasher advised. "Buy yourself cheap cases and bags. Get those which look as if they were made in Europe for the use of second or third class passengers. Wash off them all the steamer pasters and high-priced hotel labels. You will never lose baggage of that sort. Furthermore, you will find your hotel bills are much less. Rates in many European hotels are fixed in accordance with the appearance of the travelers' baggage and attire."

40 Gangsters Mob Lone Policeman

Attack Follows Attempt to Dis-
perse Loiterers at Colo-
nial Park.

New York, Sept. 14.—Suffering from lacerations, contusions and internal injuries, his uniform torn to shreds, Patrolman David A. Wilson was taken to Harlem Hospital, the victim of 40 gangsters, who assaulted him in a body.

A complaint had been made to Captain Edward P. Mulrooney by Mrs. Louise Johnson that she had been insulted by a band of men in front of Colonial Park. When Wilson reached the place he found a crowd of men loitering and ordered them to move on. They hesitated and Wilson jabbed several of them with the end of his night stick. Then some one threw a stone, striking the patrolman in the face, and the men fled south along Broadway avenue.

Wilson gave chase and was struggling with one of the men when another tripped him. As he fell about 40 of the gangsters crowded around him and beat him until a passing taxi-cab driver frightened them away by blowing a police whistle.

Wilson was badly injured internally, and was removed to Harlem Hospital, where it was said later that his condition was serious. A patrol wagon filled with the reserve of detectives searched cellars, yards and Colonial Park for the gangsters, but failed to make any arrests.

Owing to the absence from the city of some witnesses, the inquest into the death of Thomas McCarthy has been postponed until next Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

Spaghetti Hurdled At Liquor Raiders

Patrons Also Used Chairs in
Battle During Search for
Allegation.

New York, Sept. 14.—Compelled in one instance to kidnap a doorman in order to effect an entrance, two Federal agents, assisted by five detectives, raided several clubs and restaurants. They reported that while searching the Blue Garden at 159 West Forty-sixth street they were assaulted by patrons, who hurled chairs and cooked spaghetti at them.

After confiscating some alleged

When the agents arrived at the Terminal Club, in a lofty building at 135 West Thirty-third street, they found a doorman on guard. Before he had a chance to signal his employers the agents bundled him into an automobile and took his keys away from him. Excited men and women inside tried to effect an escape while the agents were entering. The agents said attempts to interfere with their work were made by several patrons.

After confiscating a quantity of alleged liquor they arrested Charles Ross, the doorman; John Burke and Abraham Stein.

Many laborers have emigrated to Hawaii in the hope of finding better employment conditions in the sugar industry.

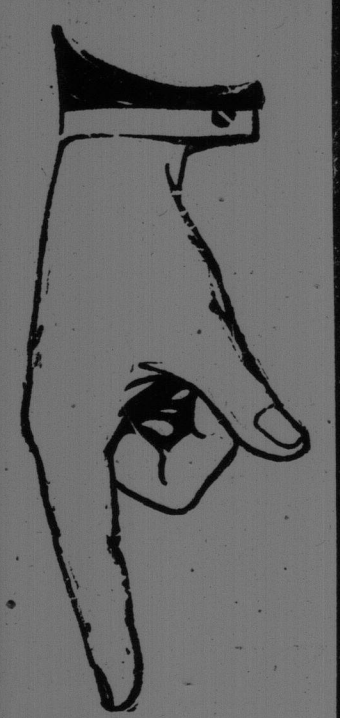
