GREB HAS CHANCE TO GET \$10,000

Offer from Suffolk to Meet Wilson-Robinson Bout Winner.

Boston, Oct. 17.—If Harry Greb wants to come back to Boston and corral \$10,000, he can get it by breaking sticks. All he has to do is some fighting, all of which is more or less in his line. But the hitch comes that to connect with the \$10,000 he must meet the winner of the Wilson-Robinson bout, which takes place at the Arena on Friday night.

Though Boston's financial limit for a big bout is \$20,000, Tom Goodwin, matchmaker for the Suffolk A. A., is of the opinion that a fray between Greb and the victor of Friday night would draw \$40,000.

"I am willing to take the chance," said Goodwin, "and will give Greb \$10,000 flat for 10 rounds though he cannot come in weighing 175 pounds. If he doesn't draw then the Suffolk A. A. is stuck, but I will give the money into Greb's hands one minute after he crawls through the ropes and shows me that he is in condition to battle."

A \$40,000 house would break all records for a Boston fight gathering, but it would seem that the statements of the Suffolk A. A. matchmaker are worthy of consideration, particularly the clause that Greb and Wilson or Robinson weigh 160 pounds, middle-weight limit.

The Wilson-Robinson classic has stirred up unusual interest among those who like to do scraps in advance and strange to say, fans are quite evenly divided on the probable outcome. There are many who feel that Robinson will stop Wilson, if not handicapped by referee.

NEW PLANS FOR U. S. NO. ATLANTIC SHIPS

Consolidation of Five Trade Routes and Elimination of Managing Agent System.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Decision to consolidate the five major North Atlantic-United Kingdom trade routes and to eliminate entirely the managing agent system now in use upon them, was announced today by the United States shipping board.

A probable solution of the operation problem of the Government merchant fleet was seen by board officials in the new plan, which was said to be designed as an experiment.

Considerable reduction is contemplated in the number of ships now being operated under the five routes. A new trade name will be taken for the consolidated routes, the North Atlantic-United Kingdom Line having already received favorable consideration.

The principal change effected by the new scheme, Chairman Farley explained, is that it places the expenditures of funds appropriated by congress directly under the supervision of public officials authorized to handle them.

Supervision of the United States lines has been placed in the hands of a committee composed of Commissioners O'Connor, Plummer and Benson, who will act as a board of directors. The new plan was said by officials of the board to make the U. S. lines "practically a separate subsidiary of the Emergency Fleet Corporation."

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PRICES TREND STILL DOWNWARD

Selling of Western Rails Resumed in Wall Street This Morning.

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BIG GAIN IN TRADE OF CANADA NOTED

Six Months Period Shows Increase in Both Exports and Imports.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—A notable increase in Canada's trade for the six months ended with September as compared with the same period a year ago, is recorded by the department of customs and excise. Equally satisfactory increases are shown in both imports and exports. While the total trade for September last was compared with September of 1922 shows some \$7,000,000 increase, this is, however, accounted for entirely by imports.
