MARQUIS OF LONDONDERY TO CLOSE HIS BIG MANSION

London, May 18.—Because of tremendous taxation, the Marquis of Londonderry, one of the wealthiest British peers, announces that he will close his great mansion, Seatham Hall, at Seatham Harbor, County Durham. The Seatham estate contains some of the richest coal mines in England, from which the Marquis and his family draw a great income.

The marquis owns a mansion in North Wales, as well as Castle Mount Stewarts, County Down, and Londonderry House, a great residence in Park Lane here. The closing of a house like Seatham Hall, where costly entertainments were given, is a great loss to the tradesmen and others in the neighborhood. Even when such places are bought by men who made fortunes in the war, they are not kept up in the same style.

Because they could not bear the burden of taxes, eight dukes and nearly two dozen other peers and industrial magnates have sold their country estates in the last two years.
