BUDGET PASSES WITH MAJORITY OF EIGHTEEN

Nine Progressives and one Independent Vote with Government—Drayton Amendment Rejected.

By a majority of eighteen, the government carried its budget proposals early this morning. The vote was, for the budget, 119; against, 101. Nine Progressives and one Independent voted with the government. The Drayton amendment was rejected by a vote of 167 to 44, a majority of 123. Several Progressives, although in their seats, did not vote. On being requested by the speaker to do so, the vote was modified to 169 against the amendment and fifty-one for, a majority amendment and fifty-one for, a majority

Of the nine Progressives who sur ported the government seven represented Ontario and two British Columbia con-Ontario and two British Columbia constituencies. They were: Reed (Frontenac), Hodgins (Middlesex), Elliott (Dundas); Elliott (Waterloo South), Sexsmith (Lennox and Addington), Hammell (Muskoka), Binette (Prescott), McBride (Cariboo), Humphrey (West Kootenay). 




