COUNTY COUNCIL

Authority to Sell Houses Granted—Comment on Coal Bills—Fire Hydrants for Lancaster.

The consumption of coal at the General Public Hospital and how to dispose of the houses built by the County Housing Board were the subjects that received most consideration at the regular May meeting of the municipal council which was held yesterday afternoon in the county court room, German street.

The report of the committee on finance and accounts was presented by the chairman of the committee, Councillor King Kelley, and was taken up section by section.

The report showed that after George H. Waring had examined the mangle at the General Public Hospital and found it in good working order the committee advised the purchase of a new mangle at a cost of from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

The committee authorized the secretary and treasurer to pay the several institutions on account of the warrant issued in their favor eighty-eight per cent of the assessment and to inform the institutions that they should confine their expenditures to the itemized budget submitted to the council.

The committee considered the proposed changes to be made in the Nurses' Home and authorized an expenditure of \$625 to cover such changes. The bonds amounting to \$100,000 were sold on April 3 at par, a broker's commission of one and one-half per cent being allowed.

The committee authorized the payment of \$800.84 to Murray and Gregory for supplies in the erection of a new fire station at Patricie.

HALIFAX ARTIST WINS THE PRIZE

Ernest Lawson Awarded Gold Medal and \$1,500 at International Exhibition.

Ernest Lawson, the well known Halifax artist, now of New York, who has become so prominent in art circles in America, scored another big success with his painting, "Vanishing Mist," by capturing the gold medal and \$1,500 prize at the twentieth annual International exhibition at the Carnegie Art Museum in Pittsburgh, recently.

"Vanishing Mist" is a work that, though deeply beautiful, is hard to classify. Mr. Lawson's present day art is a modified Post Impressionist style, but it is not a mere imitation of the Impressionist movement.

For more than ten years, at first as critic of the New York Herald and then as art critic of the New York Tribune, Mr. Lawson has been writing about the pictures of Ernest Lawson. In every review he has insisted that the artist would some day be accorded recognition as one of America's foremost landscape painters.
