GREAT SEIZURES
OF PROVISIONS IN
STATES GOING ON

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 18.—Federal officials here have seized 284,180 pounds of coffee held in storage in a warehouse on a label information issued by the United States district attorney. It was alleged in the information that the coffee was held for J. A. K. & Co. of New York. The information alleged that the coffee had been in the warehouse since Oct. 1, and was wilfully and illegally hoarded to increase its price. The federal district court was asked for an order giving permission to condemn and confiscate the lot and sell it in a way to provide for an equitable distribution. The coffee will remain in custody of the United States marshal until after a court hearing.

Cleveland, Aug. 19.—J. C. Breitenstein, assistant United States attorney for northern Ohio, has announced that a libel has been filed under the Lever act for seizure and condemnation of 200,000 pounds of sugar belonging to the C. D. Kinney Company of Baltimore and held in storage by the Canton Storage and Transfer Company at Canton, Ohio. Deputy Sheriff Walsh seized the sugar. E. S. Wert, United States attorney, will ask Judge Westenhaver in the federal court here to adjudge the sugar hoarded and order it condemned. If such an order is made the sugar will be sold by the government.

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 19.—Nearly a million eggs were seized by the federal authorities here at the cold storage plant of Noel & Co. The eggs, which were the property of Alloway Brothers, local produce dealers, were declared by the United States attorney to constitute a supply largely in excess of the reasonable requirements of business.

CANNOT MARRY
GERMAN WIVES

Washington Refuses to Sanction
Weddings of Soldiers

Coblenz, Aug. 19.—Persistent reports that Americans are being permitted to marry German girls have led to the issuing of a statement by the civil affairs administration here that only about twenty such marriages have been sanctioned. These cases were those in which it was considered just to protect the interests of German girls.

There have been several hundred applications for permission for marriages, but the general policy has been adhered to of refusing permission at this time. Not a small number of American soldiers have left behind promises to return for or send for their German sweethearts when the law permits them to do so.

There is no disposition on the part of the army administration to lighten the responsibility of Americans where marriage has been promised, but the rule against marriage with women of an enemy country has had to be generally enforced. This has led to no little complaint on the part of some soldiers who are perfectly sincere in their wish to marry German girls and who can see no disloyalty to their country in doing so.

SIR HORACE PLUNKETT
TRIES GUESS AT LLOYD
GEORGE'S IRISH VIEWS

Dublin, Aug. 19.—(Associated Press)—Sir Horace Plunkett, one of the directors of the Irish Dominion League, referring to a published statement that the league was "Lloyd George-inspired," said: "There is no foundation, I regret to say, for the suggestion that the prime minister has directly or indirectly given more encouragement to the league's programme than to the Sinn Fein. When Lloyd George's policy appears on the film it is far more likely to feature partition than the unity of Ireland, which the league is convinced can be best secured on the dominion plan."

The Irish Dominion League is composed of men who believe that an Irish republic is unattainable and undesirable, but that a prompt measure of home rule on the fullest colonial lines is urgently necessary. It was formed in last June.

TRAINLOADS OF SUGAR

TO SAVE FRUIT CROP

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—Immediate relief in the difficult sugar situation in the west may be looked for as a result of a conference between representatives of the Fruit Growers' Association and Eastern sugar refiners with members of the cabinet held at the invitation of the Canadian Trade Commission.

The net outcome is that sugar, literally in trainloads, will be sent forward by special arrangements with the refiners and the railways. No doubt exists that the supply will reach its destination in time to save the British Columbia fruit crop from being wasted.

It was reported that there are at present in British Columbia 100,000 tons of preserving fruits, chiefly plums, prunes, peaches, pears and cranberries. These fruits are not actually preserved by the Fruit Growers' Association, but are shipped fresh to the prairie provinces, where they are bought by the consumers usually in case lots, and it was customary for consumers to purchase the same through the distribution of the eastern supplies will be undertaken by the refiners' agents.

Other shipments will go forward in due course, but it is certain that the present prompt action will relieve what had become a serious deadlock in the fruit supply. This arrangement is entirely in addition to supplies in excess of normal consumption which have been shipped from eastern refiners in the last few days.

COAST TO COAST FLIGHT.

Halifax to Vancouver in Forty Hours Projected.

Winnipeg, Aug. 19.—It is expected the proposed airplane flight from Halifax, N. S., to Vancouver, B. C., will be accomplished in forty hours of actual flying.

This was the statement of R. C. Crowe-Swords, agent for the British Columbia Association which is organizing the trans-Canadian flight.

The flight, according to Mr. Crowe-Swords, will be started from Halifax about Sept. 20. It is intended to make stops at Toronto or Montreal, Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Calgary and Vernon, and at all the cities at which the aviators call a halt an exhibition of "stunt" flying will be given. The aviators will be Lester D. K. Trimble and Lieut. W. H. Welsh, navigating officer, both of Vancouver. The plane to be used will be a de Havilland.

OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE
VALLEY RAILWAY THURSDAY

The official opening of the Valley Railway will take place on Thursday, it is officially announced. For the occasion, Hon. F. B. Carvell, chairman of the railway commission, has placed his private car at the disposal of the government. He, with members of the provincial executive, who meet at Fredericton today, will take part in the formal opening trip along with officials of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, members of the press and other prominent personalities.

Final inspection of the Valley road will be made on Saturday, when the operation engineer of the C. N. R. and chief engineer C. O. Fox of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company will travel over the new line by motor lorry.

On Monday next, it is anticipated, the C. N. R. will have service established as negotiations with the C. P. R. for running rights are being expedited.

There is considerable freight offering on the new line.

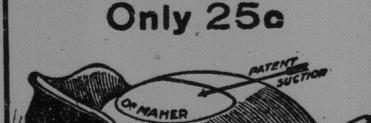
WANT GOVT. ENGINEER

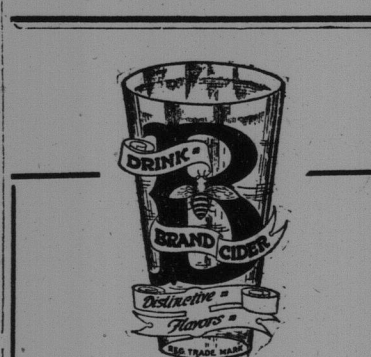
