**IN THREE SECTORS ALLIES WIN FURTHER SUCCESSES**

(Undated War Dispatch By The Associated Press.)

The Allied armies have obtained further successes over the Germans in fighting in the Soissons-Rheims sector and to the north in the Montdidier region and still further north in Flanders between the Lave and Clarence Rivers.

East of the town of Braine on the Vesle River, midway between Soissons and Rheims, American and French troops, after the stiffest kind of fighting have crossed the river and held all the positions gained.

The French to the north of Rheims have penetrated the German positions for more than four hundred yards in the railroad beginning at Rheims and running northeastward toward Retel and northwestward to Laon. In addition all the positions previously gained by the Allied troops throughout the entire Rheims-Soissons salient have been solidly held, notwithstanding counter attacks and the heavy artillery fire the enemy has poured down from the heights north of the Vesle upon their antagonists. Near where the Vesle enters the Aisne, east of Soissons, the French have overcome the resistance of the enemy and taken the village of Ciry-Salengue.

London, Aug. 7.—Losses of British merchantmen during July were less than they were in June, Sir Leo Money, parliamentary secretary to the shipping ministry, announced in the House of Commons this afternoon.

Washington, Aug. 7.—Major-General William S. Graves, commanding the 8th division at Camp Fremont, California, has been assigned to command American troops ordered to Siberia, General March, chief of staff, announced today.

The nucleus of the American forces sent to Siberia, General March said, would be the 27th and 31st regular regiments on duty in the Philippines, which would be supplemented later by troops from the United States.
