WELCOME SIGN IN PLACE

The new sign extending a welcome to the incoming settlers at the port of St. John has been placed in position. It is 44 inches high and 38 feet long. It bears the words: "Welcome to Canada," in Roman letters, on a background of royal blue, forming the colors of the Women's Canadian Club at whose expense the sign has been erected. The sign was prepared and placed in position by H. L. & J. T. McGowan. Its location is on the southern side of the immigration shed.

Secured Images For Russians

The vast majority of the hundreds of thousands of Japanese and Russians killed in the Russo-Japanese war were identified, after the battle of the sea, by means of the little metal tokens or sacred pictures images, found on the bodies.

Each Japanese soldier carried a tiny aluminum tag worn inside the waistband and bearing a number corresponding with the number in the regimental list. So terrible were the losses that the soldiers were literally blown to bits by hand-grenades, that orders were issued that the bodies should be placed inside the soles of the boots. It was found that even if shells actually struck a man and blew him to atoms his boots were always found intact.

Germany, like Bulgaria, has more than one way of identifying its dead after a battle. Each soldier carries three metal discs about the size of a half-crown stamped with his number and corps. One disc is sewn inside the collar of the great coat, another is placed inside the sole of the trousers, and the third in the heel of the right boot.

How well this system works was shown at Yonville and Gravelotte, two of the worst battles of the war of 1870. These battles were fought in front of Metz on August 16th and 18th, the Germans losing over 40,000 officers and men. Yet complete casualty lists were received in Berlin two days later!

If Austria does decide to fight, her soldiers will be recognized by an elaborate brass locker which each one wears. This locker contains a number of leaves of parchment on which are written particulars of the owner, his name, age, date of enlistment, the town or village where he was born, and other particulars.

In the Spanish-American war the badges of the American soldiers were stolen by the Filipinos. These metal badges were very elaborate and were looked upon as great finds by the enemy. As a result, however, the United States government discarded this metal badge for a cloth tag, in which was woven a number and letter identifying the owner.

During the Abyssinian war hundreds of the zinc name-plates carried by the Italian soldiers were carried off by Menelik's warriors, who wore them as charms. Consequently to this day the fate of many of the Italian wounded and prisoners is not known.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 20.-Potatoes have taken a slump during the last week and none are being bought for shipment. It is reported from Carleton county that shippers there are offering eighty cents.

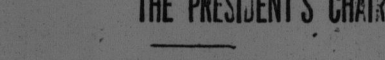
The annual financial statement of St. Dunstan's church shows receipts of \$42,929 and expenditure of \$37,769. The balance goes to St. Dunstan's school fund.

IDENTIFYING THE DEAD ON THE FIELD OF BATTLE

Germans Recognized by Disc in Heel of Boot - Russians by Sacred Images

Turkey is the only European country which takes practically no trouble to see that its soldiers killed in war shall be identified. Every other country makes its fighters carry "identity discs," "marks" or in some other way provides that its dead soldiers will be recognized.

Each Bulgarian soldier, for instance, carries several metal identification plates, each of which has on it his name, number, and corps. These plates each man is directed to fix away in various parts of his clothing, so that, however badly he may be wounded, there will be at least one plate by which he can be identified.

It is because of the terrible effects of modern artillery fire that soldiers should carry several means of identification, if killed. During the Boer War, for example, soldiers had an identification card sewn into some portion of their clothing.

After Spion Kop no trace could be found of the bodies of the six hundred British soldiers, but for months he was supposed to be in the hands of the Boers. It transpired, however, that he had been blown almost literally to atoms by the explosion of a shell, and his identification card destroyed.

It is such a rare thing given to the legal mind. It was the forty-eighth congress that Mr. Payne first took his seat and the present is the sixty-second.

Between the chairman and Mr. Payne sits Francis Barton Harrison, the democratic representative of the sixteenth congressional district of New York. Mr. Harrison is a free trader almost of the Manchester school of British radicals. He is a strong advocate of the heavy taxation of luxuries. When some republican member of the committee is closely pressing a witness into a difficult position, Mr. Harrison's address pointed out the evidence with a cross question. He served as a private in the war with Spain.

To the left of Mr. Payne are his fellow Republicans, the "Gentlemen from Connecticut." They might be taken as the prototype of Uncle Sam, minus the stars and stripes, is Ebenezer J. Hill. There is little of the Spartan style of questioning about Mr. Hill. He questions a free trade witness much as a terrifier argues with a witness who has placed inside the soles of his shoes a reply of testimony which he does not approve.

THEY'RE KEEN THESE MEN WHO MAKE TARIFFS MOVING PICTURES OF CHEESE MAKING

Ontario Professor Advocates Advanced Step in Education

Woodstock, Jan. 20.-The use of the moving picture and the drama for the purpose of educating farmers in agriculture and dairy methods has a champion in H. H. Dean, professor of dairy husbandry at the Ontario Agricultural College, whose paper on "Cheese Investigations at the Experimental College during the Past Three Years," was read by George W. McKay at the dairymen's convention here. Professor Dean's address pointed out the educational value of a moving picture show or drama with fitting music to show all the different processes of farming or dairymaking. These would include scenes on the farm, in which family and hired men would take part, the making, refining and inspection, the loading upon the steamer, the handling in England and receiving into the warehouses, and then the pleasure or dissatisfaction of the consumer.

"We have three moving picture theatres in Guilford, and they are filled every night," said the professor. "The people go there because they like to see life in motion. We have apparently reached the limit on some old lines of thought, and it is useless to cling to them. Therefore, I say that the idea of putting forth by studied psychological means, the picture of the educational value of a moving picture show or drama, is the cleanest, brightest company to be secured for teaching Ontario teaching agriculture from the stage free of charge. Why not? Morals were first taught from the stage, and in olden days people received their first moral and religious instructions from the same source."
