Holiday Bill Will Be Continued This Evening—"Mary" Pictures Tomorrow

Evidently the people of St. John desire to show their thankfulness for having so fine a place of entertainment as Imperial Theatre accorded them, as they attended the new Keith house in great numbers all day yesterday. The Imperial people put themselves out to make the programme truly of a holiday character, and the people showed their appreciation by loud applause and favorable comments.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The dredge Provincial, No. 1, which has been ordered to proceed to St. John, has again resumed operation in Digby, and is now widening the channel in the Raccoon.

As Bishop March was celebrating mass in Harbor Grace on Sunday, a James Hare, believed to be insane, fired two shots at him. One inflicted a slight wound in the bishop's head, the other struck the altar. Hare was overcome by men nearby and arrested. The bishop continued mass after a doctor bound his wound.

Sir Rufus Isaacs has definitely been appointed lord chief justice in England, and J. A. Simon, solicitor-general, succeeds him. Baron Alverston becomes a viscount.

The trial of Joseph and James Collins and Walter Preston is going on in New-castle. The charge is throwing a sleeper on the track, and that a wreck was nearly caused.

Roland Carter, aged sixteen, while hunting at St. Margaret's Bay, N. S., on Saturday was shot and killed. He was killing a snake with the butt end of his gun and the weapon was discharged. His father, Robert Carter, accountant, was in St. John at the time and was summoned home.

The Kings and Queens Counties Institute has elected N. S. Fraser, B. A., president; John Draper, vice president; Wm. Biggar, secretary-treasurer; Miss Cora Bennett and Miss Mabel Martin, members of the executive.

George D. Titus, formerly of St. John, the new proprietor of the Royal Hotel at Woodstock, was tendered a banquet last night by fifty or sixty of his old friends of that town.

Premier Borden, accompanied by Mrs. Borden, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Hon. Robt. Rogers and George Baskard, will leave Ottawa today to inspect new public works at Quebec. Mr. Borden will be the guest of honor at a banquet tomorrow evening and will remain at Quebec to welcome H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught.

William Sulzer, the impeached governor of New York, was nominated last night for the assembly, by the Progressives. In 1889 Sulzer began his political career in this branch of the state legislature.

The steamer Vandick with Colonel Theodore Roosevelt aboard arrived at Rio Janeiro last night, but, owing to heavy storms, the colonel was unable to land. Elaborate preparations have been made for the reception of the ex-president.

After being detained at Ellis Island, New York, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the British suffragette, was allowed to enter the United States yesterday, and President Wilson gave her permission to travel at will throughout the states during her two weeks' lecture engagements. Halifax, Oct. 30—Calhoun Dauphine, aged 17 years, who was accidentally shot hunting at Tantallon on Friday last died of his injuries in the hospital here today.

By means of a long process of selection, covering more than a century, the dwellers on the island of Sikoku, Japan, have perfected a breed of roosters with tail feathers more than eighteen feet in length.

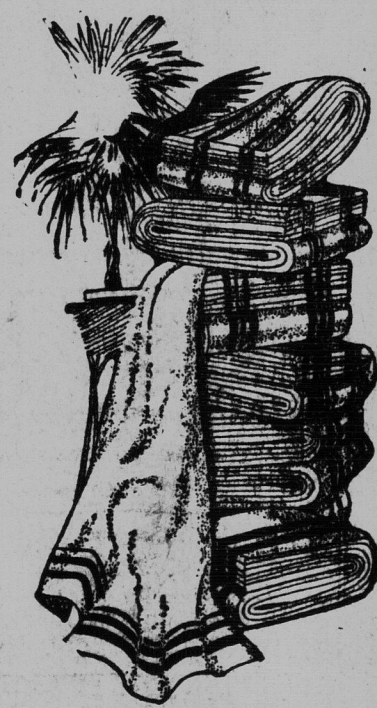

SOME STRANGE PETS

The late Lord Avebury used to keep pet wasps, and on one memorable occasion he exhibited a "tame" wasp at one of the sittings of the British Association. A certain well-known actress makes pets of huge spiders, and delights in feeding them, attending to their comfort, and generally mothering them and making them as happy as spiders can ever hope to be.

A French comtesse, who is well known for her beauty and her eccentricities, wore during last season as a neck ornament a beautiful scarabeus beetle. It was tethered to a ring by a very slender gold chain, which allowed the insect to run about on the lady's shoulder. As that shoulder was always bare when the lady wore her beetle, it may be taken for granted that the comtesse had lost—if ever she had it—that feminine horror of anything creepy-crawly.

An invention has been brought to light which will serve to considerably minimize the dangers to which every day the large number of underground workers in the United Kingdom are exposed.

A clever German subject, J. H. Reincke, of Westphalia, has invented a system of wireless telegraph for use in mines. The system has been adopted at Dinington Main Colliery in Yorkshire, where instruments have been fixed at two points and conversations have been carried on with the same ease as is the case with ordinary telephones.

There is a portable instrument adapted for use in the case whilst ascending and descending the shaft, and so a means of communication with those above ground in time of disaster has been established. By this means rescue work will be considerably facilitated, for entombed miners will be in direct communication with the pit-head, thus being able to call for assistance and give directions as to their whereabouts and the best means of reaching them.

DISEASE KILLS HOGS

(Frederick Gleaner)

A strange disease is causing the death of many hogs and young pigs.

Stanley Chase of St. Mary's has lost thirty-one pigs by death during the last ten days, the last of his lot dying on Friday. He states the pigs first become weak in the knees and then their backs and kidneys showed signs of weakness.

Then it was noticed that a small pink spot appeared on the back of the ear, and a day or so after this was noticed, the animal generally died. The first of his herd died ten days ago, and every day since then one or more have died. His loss is somewhere in the vicinity of \$400. The individual weight of the pigs varied from 20 to 30 pounds.

Fred McFarlane, of Nashwaakias has also lost some of his pigs from the disease, four dying during the last week, and all showing similar symptoms to those of Mr. Chase.

Nobody seems able to account for the disease, it being different from hog cholera and other diseases which have raged in this province in recent years.
