THOS. KICKHAM NEW LIQUOR LICENSE COMMISSIONER

Will Succeed Florence McCarthy on June 1—Trouble in Local Conservative Circles Over It

The following appointments by the local government are gazetted:—Thomas Kickham, to be a member of the board of liquor license commissioners for the City of Saint John, in place of F. McCarthy, whose term of office will expire on June 1; G. Heber Vroom to be a justice of the peace; Joshua P. Clayton, to be a commissioner of the Great Marsh in the place of the late Thomas Dotts.

Charlotte—Arthur Popple, Albert Thompson and John Robert Polley, justices of the peace; Frank Scott, commissioner of the parish of St. David civil court, in place of Joseph R. Simpson, deceased.

York—J. McArthur, commissioner for taking affidavits.

Kent—J. B. Gallant, St. Louis, justice of peace.

Gloucester—J. Edward DeGrace, of Petit Rocher, justice of the peace.

In connection with the government's re-ignition of Mr. McCarthy as a liquor license commissioner and the appointment of Mr. Kickham in his place there is a story of a trouble for the license government when it next appeals to the people. This matter of the St. John commissionery has been causing a lot of trouble for some time and it is understood that Mr. McCarthy had served notice on the government that if he were not reappointed he would see to it that his friends' wishes and be a candidate in St. John at the next election; further than this, that if he did not receive the party nomination he would run as an independent.

REGRET THAT REV. MR. GRAHAM IS TO LEAVE ST. DAVID'S

Congregational Meeting Last Night Appoints Committee To Go Before Presbytery—Money Gift to Retiring Pastor

At a preliminary congregational meeting of the members of St. David's church, held last evening in consequence of a notice having been received citing representatives of the church to appear before the St. John Presbytery with reference to the resignation of the pastor, Rev. A. A. Graham, resolutions were passed expressing regret at the departure of the pastor and seven commissioners were appointed to attend a meeting of the presbytery at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The following were chosen: P. Chisholm, James South, A. R. Melrose, R. B. Paterson, Charles Robinson, J. T. McGowan and T. H. Somerville.

As Mr. Graham has accepted the principalship of the new Saskatchewan College, under the direction of the Saskatchewan Presbytery, and has asked the church to acquiesce in his request to be relieved of the pastorate of St. David's, the commissioners were instructed to so report to the presbytery today. Mr. Graham will leave for his new charge about June 1.

The congregation last evening unanimously instructed the trustees to issue a check for \$200 as a free gift to the retiring pastor.

A committee was also appointed to arrange for a congregational farewell to Rev. Mr. Graham and Mrs. Graham, when an address will be presented. Peter Chisholm presided at the session, presided at the meeting.

Mr. Graham is leaving St. David's church at a time when it was never in better condition, either financially or numerically, and he will carry with him to his western charge the best wishes of the people here, not only in his own church but in the city generally.

As the pulpit has not yet been declared vacant, the church is not in a position to extend a call to a new pastor, and a statement in one of the papers a few days ago that Rev. Dr. Smith, of Fredericton, had declined a call was therefore incorrect. According to the officers of the church, a call has not been extended to anyone, nor could be until after the presbytery declares the pulpit vacant.

As Mr. Graham is desirous of visiting other churches in the presbytery before he goes away, he is exchanging pulpits with a number of the ministers. Next Sunday Rev. S. J. McArthur, of Newcastle, will preach in St. David's.

PROBATE COURT

An Interesting Point in Loch Lomond Case Before Judge Armstrong Today

The matter of the estate of Edward Nelson, farmer, of Loch Lomond road came up in the probate court today. He died on January 2, 1883, a week after he had made his will, on which he placed his executor, the will was witnessed by the late Alexander Ballentine, barrister-at-law, and the late Edmund Lawton, who kept the Hart House on the Loch Lomond Road. Both witnesses had died when in 1884 application was made to the probate court to prove the will.

The application was refused on the ground that the probate court act provides that, when all the witnesses to an will are dead, the probate court grant probate on proof of the handwriting of the testator, and of the testator together with the fact of his death, the court holding that the testator, subsequently stated that he had executed the same, and the whereabouts of the will during the meantime having been accounted for, the will was today admitted to probate and the executors named therein, namely, the widow, Mary Ann Nelson, and a daughter, Catherine Elizabeth Nelson, were sworn.

The real estate is \$1,800, subject to a mortgage for \$800; personal estate, \$775. Stephen B. Bislin is executor.

The court also took up the matter of the estate of Mary Ann Bardeley, deceased, wife of John Bardeley of St. John, latter, she died in April, 1888 leaving her husband, who subsequently died, and two sons, Joseph P. Bardeley and Robert Bardeley. The latter has also since died leaving a wife and nine children. On the petition of the surviving son, Joseph P. Bardeley, he was appointed administrator. There is no real estate; personal estate \$600. Homer D. Forbes is probator.
