In the 2:21 trot, Brickley up, made it three wins after going four heats, Lena Marie taking the first one. The best time in this class was 2:20 1/4. Chimes 'Till came through a winner in the 2:25 trot, purse \$400, after five heats. The best time was 2:17 1/4.

CHAMPIONSHIP
GAME IN N. S. ON
WEDNESDAY

Truro, N. S., Sept. 19.—The big game between Middleton and Springhill for the baseball championship of Nova Scotia will be played at Truro on Wednesday afternoon, September 21, at 2.30 o'clock. Both teams have agreed to stage the big battle here. The game will be on the diamond at the T. A. A. C. grounds and will doubtless draw many thousands of people.

FREDERICTON RACES.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 19.—More than \$6,000 in purses will be competed for at the Fredericton exhibition races, to be started on the four days commencing tomorrow. The meeting will open with a feature programme on the first day, a matched race between John R. Braden, 2:02 3/4, champion pacer of Maine, and Roy Volo, 2:08 1/4, champion of the maritime provinces, being scheduled for Tuesday afternoon. One of the other two races on the card for the opening day is the 2:19 pace, a class race, which will have probably half a dozen or more starters, with Jeffrey, 2:16 1/4, owned by the Hartland Driving Club; Hayward Wilkes, 2:19 1/4, the Houlton-owned pacer, and High Knob Beauty, 2:19 1/4, owned by Harry Jewett of this city, likely to be the most highly favored. The third race tomorrow will be the 2:15 pace, which will have a smaller field than expected, because Fern Hal, 2:05 1/4, and Little Anna S., 2:11 1/4, have been retired for the season because of lameness. HAD ONE REGRET

SIR JOHN SIMON
New York, Sept. 19.—Sir John Simon carried a poignant regret back to England when he sailed on the Aquitania on Tuesday. He hadn't been able to see Babe Ruth in action.

Speaking of his five weeks' visit to the New World—during which he attended the American Bar Association convention in Cincinnati and the Canadian Bar Association assemblage in Ottawa—Sir John said: "We're sailing, and it's too late."

"For what?" he was asked.

"To see your—er—Babe Ruth perform."

Sir John was tendered a farewell dinner by the New York Bar Association. Speaking at the dinner, Sir John suggested that if the lawyers of the United States will devote themselves to making

permanent the principles for which so many laid down their lives in France they will surely be doing much to save the world from future misery and destruction.

"The quotation on Grant's tomb, 'Let us have peace,' he said, 'might well be adopted by all English-speaking people as their watchword in a movement to perpetuate the existing Anglo-American friendship.'"
