NO FURTHER OUTBREAK AMONG TENNESSEE MINERS.

The Miners in Mass Meeting Pledge Themselves to No Violence, and Choose a Committee to Confer with Gov. Buchanan, to Settle the Coal Strike.

Coal Camp, Tenn., July 23.—There is practically nothing new in the mine trouble. After the quiet, but determined, mob of miners had done its worst yesterday, and the militia had been sent off to Knoxville, the visiting miners left for home, and the Coal Creek valley was again as quiet as a country village on Sunday.

The 500 militia mentioned in last night's dispatch had arrived at Knoxville, and are now in camp at the University of Tennessee. Brig-Gen Carney of Memphis is in command, and he says that he is simply waiting orders from Gov. Buchanan.

The meeting of miners which was called for noon resulted favorably. When the men first assembled, there were a few hot heads who began to talk about damaging the company's property but they were outsiders and not miners. The mine leaders took possession of the meeting. Mr. Ingram was called to preside. There were speeches by a number of the leaders, all of a conservative tone, advising against any act in violation of the law. The men said they simply wanted the courts taken away, nothing more nor less. Finally a resolution was unanimously passed to appoint a committee of five to go to Knoxville and Nashville, if necessary, to confer with Gov. Buchanan and arbitrate the present difficulties. The committee were elected one at a time as follows: W. T. Smith, S. R. Pickering, Samuel Moore, John Harding and Josiah Thomas and Josiah, commissioner. Ford and Assistant Alleman were invited to go with the committee.

A resolution was also unanimously passed, each man pledging himself on his honor that not one dollar's worth of property should be destroyed, and that the company's property should be guarded.

It was further determined that no one should offer violence to any one, except in self-defense. A resolution was passed authorizing the committee to act for the miners.

The committee left for Knoxville on the 3:40 train, and will go to Nashville if necessary.

There is a sense of relief and quiet about the meeting. The miners seem to feel that they are taking the proper course. There was some talk in the meeting of troops coming to arrest the leaders in the attack on the company. One miner, a gray-haired man by the name of Moore, who is one of the committee, advised the men not to resist, but if caught not to resist, simply submit to arrest and go before a jury for trial. He said that he did not fear but that all would be acquitted on a trial by jury.

The meeting has resulted in good, for the men are now quiet. They are as determined as ever, but no convict shall be worked here, and say they will have all who come just as soon as troops leave.

Committee member Pickering says no attack would have been made on the troops yesterday if they had thought there would have been bloodshed. He says they had been given to understand by the militia that they would not resist if attacked.

He says the reason the attack was made was that a telegram was received from the Kentucky side at Nashville, advising a large number of men in case help was needed. The reply was for the men to hold themselves in readiness in case they were called for. Nearly every man present at the meeting today had a double barreled shot gun in his hand, a few had Winchester rifles and a small number revolvers. The meeting was held in the grove in the Knoxville Iron Company's mine, and Commissioner Alleman was instructed to draw up the resolution determining not to destroy property, and also to request the Governor to call an extra session of the Legislature to consider how to get rid of the convict lease system. All feel easier now as this action has been taken.

IRELAND'S CONDITION. Marked Improvement the Subject of Newspaper Discussion in London.

LONDON, July 23.—The discussion of the condition of Ireland, the fact that agrarian crime has diminished, that trade has increased, that evictions have lessened in number, that boycotting has almost ceased, that the plan of campaign is almost extinct and that emigration has decreased, are considerably touched upon.

During the week, five of the principal banking corporations of Ireland have held annual meetings, and while carrying large balances to their reserve funds have each declared a dividend of 10 per cent.

The standard referring to this improvement in the condition of Ireland, asserts that the discontinuance of the subsidies received from the United States is largely responsible for the improvement.

"Thanks," the Standard adds, "tripped by American dollars, will persist in their criminal and unwise conspiracy, but left to face, unaided, the consequences of their dishonest mistake, first in one place and then in another, they have found it necessary to surrender while the humiliating collapse of the plan of campaign has given warning as to the worth of the solemn pledges of agitators.

The Fall Mill Gazette says it sincerely hopes that the local government will be the serious business of the next session of Parliament, adding: "It is a home rule bill, under another name, very Home Ruler will rejoice."

Ship Building in Great Britain. At the close of the quarter ended June 30, there were 150 vessels of 750,000 gross tons under construction in Great Britain. Of these, 40 were steam and 110 sailing craft. This is against 464 vessels and 750,914 gross tons one year ago. There is a decrease of 36,240 tons from the tonnage being built March 31. One steam vessel of 450 tons and one sailing vessel of 1,600, intended for the United States, are included in the June 30 list.

FIRST EDITION. FIRE AT INDIANTOWN.

A CONFLAGRATION THAT THREATENED TO SWEEP BLOCKS AWAY.

An Early Morning Blaze drives out the occupants of three houses on Bridge Street—Names of those who suffered damage—and the amount of insurance they had on their property.
