GROWING ANXIETY ABOUT MISSING STEAMER

May Have Stranded on Little
Known South Sea
Island.

San Francisco, Sept. 8.—The anxiety
with regard to the Aeon has now
deepened almost to the certainty that
she has met with disaster, either hav-
ing founded or being stranded on
some little visited South Sea Island.

KETTLE VALLEY LINES.

No Hope of Connection at Present
With Franklin Camp.

Grand Forks, Sept. 8.—J. J. Warren
of Toronto, president of the Kettle Valley
lines, was a visitor in the city this
week. An important meeting of the
city council was held at which Mr.
Warren was present, and discussed
several points which have been in dis-
pute between the railway and the
council for some time past. Matters
were, however, settled satisfactorily to
both parties before Mr. Warren's de-
parture. In regard to the re-opening
of construction on the North
Fork branch, which is now completed
from Lynch Creek, a distance of
some twenty-five miles up the river.
Mr. Warren had little to say. The
closeness of the money market is such
that the construction of the balance of
the road to Franklin camp gives little
hope of the company putting it through
at the present time. Mr. Warren de-
parted again for the east from here.

BUSINESS WILL PICK UP.

Regina Merchant Gives His Reasons
For Optimistic Outlook.

Regina, Sask., Sept. 8.—In an inter-
view F. Cole, manager of the Trading
Company's big store, states that he
expects business to improve next year.
The last three months will be the best in
the history of Regina. During the past
season business has been exceedingly
slack, and everyone has been econo-
mizing, but from the present time on,
they are going to spend money. The
reason for this undoubtedly is the bumper
crop, which will start money free-
ly. People now need goods. When they
have the money they are good spenders,
and Mr. Cole is of the opinion that they will
have more money this fall than for
years past.

PECULIAR ACCIDENT.

Grand Forks, Sept. 8.—A queer accident
happened at the Canadian Pacific
railway's round house in this city the
other night. An engine which is used
as a "pusher" on the grades in this
vicinity was run in and the steam shut
off, but in the night the machine
started to back up, and in doing so
pushed the entire end out of the house,
shoving her tender out through the
opening and down into the dirt. A
wrecking crew at once sought down from
Eholz and had a hard time getting the
large machine back again as her trucks
were all taken from under her.

EDUCATING FUTURE KAISER.

Berkeley, Calif., Sept. 8.—At the request of
Emperor William the Crown Prince
Frederick William relating to the internal
administration of the empire are about to be widely extended. The Prince
has now combined his office of state
affairs with that of the ministry of the
interior, in which he has been engaged
for more than a year. He examined
into all the departments of this min-
istry and suggested a number of
practical reforms. The Prince has now de-
cided to enter the finance ministry at an
early date, for three months, to obtain an
insight into the national revenue expendi-
ture.

ZEPPELIN AIRSHIP FACTORY.

Rio de Janeiro, Sept. 8.—Count Zeppelin has
completed arrangements for the con-
struction of an immense airship fac-
tory at Lake Constance, and has leased
a tract of land for 50 years.

the Unity of the Catholic faith."
