Constantinople, April 27.—Sultan Abdul Hamid was deposed from the throne of Turkey to-day and his brother, Mehemid Rechad Effendi, proclaimed his successor.

Abdul Hamid was removed from the palace and his brother installed in his stead amid scenes of wildest enthusiasm. The ceremony of enthronement of the new Sultan is now in progress.

An immense throng of Young Turks surrounded the palace when Mehemid Rechad Effendi was proclaimed ruler of Turkey.

Cries of "The tyrant has fallen, hail to Rechad," were heard on every side. The crowd went wild with delight and expressions of confidence in the new regime were heard on every side.

The deposition of Abdul Hamid was decided upon jointly by the national assembly and the Mohammedan church. The assembly took a secret vote upon the question and decided that Abdul must be dethroned. This decision was submitted to Sheikh Ul-Islam, who issued a religious edict approving the action.
