Forest Extirpation Denied.

The controversy as to the denudation of the American forests has not been so prominent lately as it was a few years ago, but there are enthusiasts who still persist in proclaiming an approaching scarcity of pine and spruce in the producing districts of the northern regions of America, and when we see the enormous quantities that come forward for consumption to this country, and read of the hundreds of thousands of millions of feet used up annually in the States, we are obliged to own ourselves staggered as to their belief in the inexhaustibility of our timber supplies.

The Queen's Family at Home.

The Norwood Lumber Company has three mills at this point, with a combined capacity of 120,000 ft. a day, and yet, of the 42,000 acres that it hitherto owned, it considers 35,000 acres of its virgin forest, hundreds of thousands of acres have never been touched by other than the sportsman's axe. And these woods too are not ever green cloth the slopes of the hills and mountains of the district, which are not rough and rocky, and, though often steep, are quite accessible to the operations of the logger. The Norwood Company, which has been in the business for many years, has a diameter of nine inches, permitting the smaller trees to stand for the use of future lumbermen.
