only. The record showed that he was convicted for a first offence on Feb. 18, '96; for another first on April 9th '96; for another first on Oct. 17th '96; for a second on Aug. 6th '97, and for another first on Dec. 23rd '97. He appealed to the council to judge from the records as to whether Inspector Menzies was making an honest attempt to suppress the liquor traffic. It was clear to any honest and unbiased mind that he was not only not doing so, but by trifling with his office and running it for private purposes, encouraging the most persistent violators to continue the traffic. He knew that if the law was honestly administered, and he and his attorney would not reap the harvest they were getting by the law-breakers. Mr. Lawlor referred to the amount of the fines collected and directed attention to the fact that the expenses of Mr. Menzies and his counsel absorbed nearly all of it, while other expenses connected with the enforcement of the Act created a loss.

There were 87 cases prosecuted and convictions were obtained in 72 of them. But so lax was the administration that out of nearly \$4,000 fines imposed, but \$2,000 were collected, or what would meet these gentlemen's bill. Respect for the law and for the responsible positions they held should, therefore, cause the councillors to pause before responding to Menzies to the inspectorship. (Applause.)

CON. POND'S ARGUMENT.
Con. Pond was of the opinion that Inspector Menzies had fulfilled his duty as well as any man could and favored that he be upheld in carrying out the Scott Act. On motion of Con. Kerr, Robt. Murray, Esq., was given the privilege of addressing the council.

MR. MURRAY.
Mr. Murray said that Inspector Menzies would personally answer Mr. Lawlor's charges. He stated that such charges were false and without authenticity and that it looked suspicious for that gentleman, paid as he was by those in the liquor business, to ask for the removal of Mr. Menzies. Peter Archer's case was one actuated by spite and he was particularly in favor of the inspector's discharge because he interfered with his business by carrying out the law. In regard to the different penalties for the individual cases the officers of the law could use some discretion and as the punishment for first offences was greater than the other two, violators of the law were brought under this whenever possible; the confinement in jail if fines cannot be paid, being three and not two months as under the third offence. Mr. Murray claimed that Mr. Menzies was doing his duty faithfully and conscientiously and that he could, holding as one of that kind; that he could not be bought or bribed and the liquor sellers were afraid of him and therefore were trying to remove him. He concluded his speech by arguing that the law was being strictly enforced and that Inspector Menzies was the right man in the right position. (Applause.)

On motion of Con. Jones, Inspector Menzies was allowed to speak to the council.

INSPECTOR MENZIES.
Inspector Menzies said Mr. Lawlor had said too much about the Police Act. This gentleman was fined for a first and second offence and promised to go out of business, but he did not keep his word, and was accordingly convicted of a third offence and confined in jail for sixty days, and while there liquor continued to be sold in his place. Furthermore, that Mr. Archer had given a witness money to get out of the way when his trial was in progress, which is a very serious matter. In regard to Robert Lawlor, he continued to go out and sell liquor, and kept his word and no complaint has been lodged against him. Mr. Menzies took up one after the other of the cases cited by Mr. Lawlor and claimed that these people were prompted to go against him because he was endeavoring to enforce the Scott Act. He closed by saying he was doing his duty to the best of his ability and in conformity to the Canada Temperance Act. (Applause.)

Con. Betts then called "question" on Con. Pond's motion that Inspector Menzies be reappointed and on motion of Con. Kerr the vote was recorded with the following result:—Yea: Con. Pond, Whitney, Jones, Seim, Fowler, Johnson, Betts, Bourque, Chasman, Con. Kerr, Con. Morrison, Anderson, Sullivan, Doyle, Williston and McLaughlin, 17. Nays:—Con. Alfain, Cameron, Hays, Emerson, Scholfield, Donovan and McAllister, 7. (Con. Robinson and Campbell were absent.)

Con. Morrison's motion that the inspector's salary be \$800 was carried. On motion of Con. Jones an amendment that it be reduced to \$400 per year was carried. Con. Morrison moved the statement that the average per year in favor of the Scott Act fund amounted to \$123.05.

A REMARKABLE MOTION.
Con. Kerr made a motion that the council should pass a resolution instructing Inspector Menzies that he should enforce the first, second and third offences in proper order and that after the third to be a violation of an express provision of the Canada Temperance Act. (Applause.)

Con. Jones made a motion that Con. Betts while attending the Council meeting at Fredericton next month advocate a property tax of five cents per one hundred dollars and a poll tax of one dollar, though opposed by Con. Sullivan he was carried.

Con. Betts' motion that \$150 be assessed for Scott Act purposes was carried.

On motion of Con. Betts the reporter's bill of \$40 was approved.

Con. Pond asked who was the proper officer to collect non-resident taxes and was informed that it was the collecting justice.

POLICE MAGISTRATE'S DEFERENCE OF THE TOWN COUNCIL.
Secy. Treas. Thomson read letter from Mayor Winslow of Chatham stating that the Police Magistrate had disregarded the request of the Town Council to retain the Scott Act fines in his hands for the present, and give the money to the County Treasurer, and asking that the money be returned to the Town Treasurer.

Con. Betts' motion that the letter be laid on the table.

Con. Loggie asked if it was understood that the fines arising under the law of Chatham were to go to the town, and named Mr. Menzies's position in the matter.

Secy. Treas. said some one letter varied than he in the legal bearings of the case should answer the question.

Con. Loggie said if the fines were collected within Chatham limits, that the town might not be obliged to pay him at the upper limit, especially if the town had his own inspector.

Con. Morrison stated that if Chatham Aid that it would have to pay its share in maintaining the County Inspector. He could use the advantage in such a case, and it would result in asking for legal advice.

On motion of Con. Betts ordered that a committee of three be appointed to take action in case of any complications with Chatham in regard to the Scott Act fines, and the gentlemen appointed were Con. Betts, Morrison and Johnston.

AMUSEMENTS.
Con. Loggie's motion that \$5,300 to be assessed in the different parishes for the outstanding fund was carried.

Con. Betts' motion that the council should pass a resolution for paper lanterns was passed.

On motion of Con. Morrison it was ordered that the sum of \$1000 be assessed on the Town of Newcastle for fire purposes.

Con. Morrison's motion that \$700 be

assessed on the Town of Newcastle for police and light was carried.

THE BORROWING BILL.
The Secy. Treas. then read the bill authorizing the borrowing of money from time to time to meet the expenses of the county, this bill to be presented to the local house on motion of Con. Loggie the bill was amended to read instead of blank dollars, the sum of \$8000, and the bill passed as amended.

Several routine reports were read and passed.

THE WHARF COMMITTEE.
Con. Morrison moved that the Newcastle wharf committee be named, but before it was, Con. Kerr asked if the wharf committee of three was the one whose expenses were to be paid.

Con. Morrison asked if it was optional or compulsory that assessors should be appointed to take valuation of the county at certain periods. The Secy. Treas. said it was compulsory.

THANKS.
On motion of Con. Kerr, Con. Morrison took the chair and on motion of the Chatham councillor a vote of thanks to the Warden for his able and courteous manner of filling his office was unanimously passed by a rising vote. Con. Morrison in closing and appropriate words then extended the thanks of the council to the Warden.

The Warden, in reply, thanked the councillors for helping him in the performance of his duties, and said that he had many more and important improvements for the county in regard to good roads and other matters. He was warmly applauded when he closed his remarks.

Con. Sullivan here moved a vote of thanks to the faithful and efficient Secy. Treasurer, which was quickly and unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

The Secy. Treasurer responded in words of appreciation and pleasure at being able to attend to the service of the county. His remarks were listened to and when he made was warmly applauded.

Con. Pond then moved a vote of thanks to the reporters for their faithful work, which was carried. Charles G. Galt replied briefly.

At 6.20 p.m. the County Council, after a session of four days, adjourned sine die.

For this Evening.

An attractive and instructive illustrated lecture is to be given this evening in St. Mary's church school room by Rev. Wm. Stoughton, curate of Trinity Church, St. John, on the subject of Early English Church History. Beginning at half past seven o'clock. This lecture will be illustrated by about fifty lantern views, and will relate to the period from the time of St. Augustine's mission in Kent to the dawn of the Reformation, tracing the church's history through the Saxon and Norman periods. There will be no charge for admittance, but a collection will be made to defray the expense of the lecture and aid to the number of slide views and illustrations connected with the work.

Mr. Stoughton delivered the first lecture of this series on Monday evening, dealing with the introduction of Christianity into Britain, and tracing the British church up to the time of St. Augustine. Tombston Burned.

A fire broke out soon after midnight of last Thursday in the tombston building on Queen Street known as the "Blair Barbecue". An alarm was given, but as no provision has been made for connecting the bell with the new engine house, and there is no means by which an alarm can be communicated to the caretaker, the engine did not arrive until the new public building, which is at least ten minutes before the steam fire engine could be got at. Then the snow was so deep and the street so badly broken that it was with much difficulty that the engine was got to the house. When the water was at last, ready the whole building was on fire inside from end to end, while the central portion had partially fallen in.

By hard work the firemen got it under, but not till the building was a hot wreck. It seems that the fire originated in a part of the building occupied by Mr. Arch. McEwen, who had taken it temporarily, until he could secure better quarters. He was at the time of the fire, leaving the theatre at a private party that was being given by a leading citizen, and until he was told no idea that the fire-alarm would be raised. He had a piano and several instruments, besides other valuable musical instruments, besides household articles stored away upstairs, which together with his furniture in use were all burned. Mr. McEwen and the children having only time to escape by such chaotic means as he had on hand.

It is said that there were five families in the building who had a total number of more than thirty children. One woman with a baby only a day old was taken out and a few minutes later in a neighboring house. One of the children—a little lad—ran across the street, into Mrs. Dickson's house and up to a bedroom where he jumped into bed and was soon asleep just as if nothing had happened. For some time no one knew where he was. It was a pitiful case to see so many poor people with their hastily removed household effects—many of them broken and damaged—in the deep snow, but kind people who lived in the neighborhood sheltered and fed them temporarily and thus lessened the hardships of the situation. We are requested to especially mention Mrs. F. E. Davis's kindness to the sufferers, and also her thoughtfulness in supplying the firemen with hot coffee and other refreshments.

Most of the people burnt out lost their belongings and were rendered destitute, especially of clothing, but this deficiency and some others have been met by the efforts of some benevolent ladies and gentlemen. There was no insurance on the building, which was owned by Mr. John McDonald, builder, who will, no doubt, replace it with a structure of two or better character.
