"PRO" RUNNING GAME WOULD END SOON

Charged Race Was Fixed; Longboat Denies Report

Considerable Controversy Over Recent Smallwood-Longboat Marathon—May Held 15 Mile Event.

There will be but a short shrift for the professional distance running game on this continent if it is actually proved as it is claimed, that the race between Percy Smallwood and Tom Longboat at Pittsburgh, was fixed. Neither the Indian nor Smallwood, although the latter claims the middle distance championship of the world, has done anything particularly heroic at any time. When they met their managers have recourse to crookedness to gather in the shekels the end is not far off.

TORONTO, Feb. 1.—Tom Longboat returned to the city yesterday looking nothing like the worst after his victory over Percy Smallwood, which has caused considerable talk in view of Smallwood's win from the Indian a year ago in Philadelphia. Thursday night's race, however, is declared by the Indian's friends to have been on the level. As a matter of fact, these assert, Longboat's first defeat was a mistake, caused by new shoes and blisters on his feet. There wasn't much bet on the Pittsburgh race, it is declared, despite reports to the contrary.

Talking of the Indian reminds one that the partner of his days of glory, Thomas Flanagan, is looming into the public eye again. This time it is a professional fifteen mile Marathon. Thomas is going to promote. So many runners want to run in Thomas's Canadian Derby that he has to get them to run off in three heats on three separate nights. Able Wood, of Montreal, and the winner of the Herald Road Race in 1907, is one of them. Another is Nabehera, a Montreal youth, who started in the disastrous Marathon at the M. A. A. A. on May 24th last. Strubb, Meadows, Simpson, and rest are all in the race—anything to pick up a little piece of money these days. Harry Holman, who is not entered, has bigger game in view. He will run in the Powers Marathon at Madison Square. Longboat's name does not figure in the entry list either.

NELSON STARTS TRAINING FOR WOLGAST BATTLE

Cops It Will Take Twenty Days of Hard Work to Put Him in Condition—Match With Welsh.

Battling Nelson says he will begin training this week for his forty-five round fight with Ad Wolgast, which is scheduled to take place in San Mateo county near San Francisco on Washington's birthday. Nelson is already headed for the Coast and has engaged a referee of trainers and sparring partners to assist him in preparing for the clever Milwaukee pugilist.

The lightweight champion says it will take at least twenty days of hard work to fit him. He knows that in Wolgast he will not meet a soft mark. He promises to be able to weigh under 135 pounds at the ringside, and says he will be strong enough to make the fight of his life. Wolgast has said so many harsh things about Nelson that the latter says he will try to beat him with measure and dispatch, but Coast fight experts contend that unless Nelson is better than ever he will find Wolgast a very hard problem to solve.

Nelson is 28 years old and enjoys splendid health all the time, inasmuch as he believes in the simple life and keeps in light training all the time. After Wolgast, Nelson says he will be ready to take on Freddie Welsh under the same conditions as to weight and distance. But it is a sure thing that Welsh will not allow Nelson to get \$12,000, win, lose or draw, the plum he is to receive for his bout with Wolgast.

BEST PUGILISTS WERE FLAT-FOOTED FIGHTERS

Jim Corbett and Billy Madden are at Variance—A Comparison of the Styles of Fighting.

Jim Corbett and Billy Madden are having quite a little tilt these days regarding flat-footed fighters. Corbett says that no good man ever fought flat-footed. Corbett himself fought on his toes; he was a dancing, jabbing heavyweights but if Jim will stop to think a moment he will discover that Madden is right when he says that the world's greatest fighters were flat-footed.

Pittsinnons, who knocked out Corbett, was a flat-footed fighter as the world ever saw. The power behind his punch was helped out by this peculiar stand.

Do you think for a moment that Fitz could have jolted with that musk kick Corbett declares that Johnson, who fights flat-footed, cannot be a good boxer. Strange as it may seem, Stanley Ketchel and all of our best fighters were flat-footed.

Jeff is flat-footed, along with the others. Can you picture the big fellow carrying 260 pounds up on his toes? Why, he's tire himself out in three rounds if he even tried it. Young Griffo, acknowledged by good judges to be the cleverest man in the world at that time, was not a dancer. Griffo fought with his head. It wasn't a trick at all for him to stand in the center of the ring with his hands at his side and let the other fellow break his back trying to land.

Griffo's head did the work. He seldom moved out of range with his feet. He simply pulled his head this way and that and let the punches slide by. They tell of a time in a saloon when Griffo, standing at the bar, watched a fellow behind him try to knock his head off. Griffo simply watched the fellow in the looking glass, and as the other swung round to deliver a punch, he made him many a time in a saloon that no one could hit him in the face, and he never attempted to strike the other man.

All of this simply goes to show that boxing is not a matter of cleverness. Joe Gans won his spurs by his marvelous boxing. He never jumped like O'Brien to avoid a punch. He stopped the other fellow by sticking his glove out and stopping the punch. Jack O'Brien is a toe dancer, but he cannot punch. Jim Driscoll is another, but Jim is no better than the top thing. Of course, the pretty boxers use the toe thing, but the old boy with the alarm is planted there on the floor with both feet, and when he slams, he slams.

If you could punch as hard from the toe position, how is it that the best punchers are all set before they slam? Haven't you heard second yard advice from the corner when they fear the other fellow, "Don't let him set?" Yes, sure, when the other fellow with the kick gets set he's liable to knock the other fellow's block right out into the crowd.

Madden is right when you figure it out. The flat-footed fighter is a real bear-cat. He does his fighting with his head, and his feet, and he's always set for the crowd slam.

The men fight in San Francisco or Colma and Coffroth will probably hang up a \$20,000 purse at least. If four star featherweights are matched to box forty-five rounds at 125 pounds, weight in three hours before ring time, it is the consensus that the fight will prove one of the most sensational in the history of pugilism.

When Walcott was welterweight champion he knocked out Joe Choynski, heavyweights, in such impressive style that Kid McCoy and Jim Corbett refused to accept challenges from him. If Johnson had been fighting in those days Walcott would surely have made interesting for him. It is thought for Walcott at his best was a better all around pugilist than Sam Langford is now.
