PRES. ROOSEVELT

Had a Close Shave From a Tragic Death.

His Carriage Smashed By an Electric Car and Secret Service Craig Instantly Killed.

The Accident Took Place at Pittsfield, Massachusetts—How It Happened—Governor Crane Escaped Unhurt—The Motorman and Conductor Arrested.

PITTSFIELD, Mass., Sept. 3.—The president of the United States escaped a tragic death by only a few feet in a collision between his carriage and an electric street car in this city today...

At the conclusion of the exercises at City Park he wished to make a brief call on former U. S. Senator Henry L. Daves.

Shortly after the president left the park an electric car passed the teams, and about a mile and a half out from the city, at the beginning of Howard Hill, was nearly up to the president's carriage...

Just at this point the up grade of the hill begins, and but a short distance beyond the crossing there is a narrow bridge spanning a small brook.

The trolley car approached the bridge crossing under a good head of speed, with gears clanging, just as the driver of the president's carriage turned his leaders to cross the track.

The carriage was upset in the twinkling of an eye and one horse fell dead on the track. The other three powerful greys attached to the vehicle started to run and, dragged by them and pushed by the force of the car, the wrecked carriage was moved thirty or forty feet.

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thus escaping a similar fate. President Roosevelt, Governor and Secretary Cortelyou were thrown together in the bottom of their carriage. Almost instantly a score of men jumped to the heads of the frightened horses and stopped their further progress.

Mr. Craig's body was found just behind the car. His shoulders and chest were crushed and the body frightfully mangled.

But a few moments after the collision Mrs. C. M. Thomas and Woodruff arrived and attended the president and his secretary. Half an hour later the party appeared and resumed the journey to Lenox.

An anxious crowd meanwhile surrounded the house and the president stopped long enough to assure them that he was not injured in the least and to express his great grief at the death of Agent Craig.

Chief Nicholson of the Pittsfield police and Daniel Keryn, an officer of the New York city department, who is on his vacation in this city, were driving about 100 yards ahead of the president's carriage, and were among the first to reach his side after the collision.
