

"In respect to expenditures for vocational school equipment approved by the Vocational Board tothe extent of fifty per cent."
The language in these sections sclear. It therefore seems that, regardless of the effect of the feral grant to provinces, the provincial government is obliged by law to continue in full its pyments to local boards until such time as theschools in question fail to gain the approval of the Board of Education, or until the Act authorizing the payments is amended by the Tegislature.

Meantime it is to be hoped that some arrangement will be effected which will remove the possibility of the vocational schools being hindered in the carrying out of a very necessary work.
