THROUGHOUT THE PROVINCE

E. R. TEED, OF LIQUOR BOARD, NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH

Woodstock, Nov. 16. E. R. Teed, of Woodstock, a member of the N. B. Liquor Control Board, narrowly escaped death Saturday afternoon, when the car he was driving left the road near Bull's Creek, about five miles below Woodstock, on the trans Canada highway.

Mr. Teed was driving along at a moderate rate of speed when one of the tires blew out, causing him to lose control. The car took the ditch and overturned in a field. Mr. Teed was fortunate in escaping without even minor injuries. Had the car left the road on the other side he would hardly have been so lucky, as there is a high bank on the side next the river at the point.

TWO KILLED IN CRASH NEAR BOUCTOUCHE

Moncton, Nov. 17. - Two are dead, three are in hospitals with injuries believed to be critical and three others escaped serious injuries late Sunday night when the motor truck in which they were returning from Ste. Anne to their homes in and near Bouctouche careened into slow concrete railing at the edge of a 40-foot embankment at McIntosh Hill, three miles from Bouctouche, and plunged over the bank. The truck turned over several times in its plume before crashing in the gully at the foot.

Fred Boudreau, 19, son of Adelin Boudreau, of Ste. Anne, were killed almost instantly. James Fougere, of Shediac, the driver, died in the hospital at Rexton this morning. The injured are: William McFadden, Jr., Bouctouche, in the hospital at Rexton; George Boudreau, Bouctouche and Peter Nowlan, son of John Nowlan, of Bouctouche, in the Hotel Dieu hospital at Moncton.

JEWELLER'S RIGHT ARM IS AMPUTATED

F. O. Landry, jeweller of this town, has arm cut off by doctors to prevent blood poisoning. - The result of an auto accident.

IN ST. BASILE HOTEL-DIEU

Dr. P. H. Laporte and Dr. A. Desrochers, Edmundston surgeons, had to amputate left arm from F. O. Landry, jeweller established on Church street. The operation was performed in St. Basile Hotel-Dieu Sunday, after it became evident that injury to hand aggravated into blood poisoning.

Mr. Landry was victim of an auto accident last week, on the St. Quentin Road.

Returning from Campbellton, his car upset and the jeweller received minor injury to left hand. This later produced blood poisoning.

LOCAL CITIZEN IS DROWNED IN GREEN RIVER

Caught in fishing net, Albert H. Bourgoin, 38, loses life in icy waters of Green River. - Companion reaches shore; victim's body recovered an hour and a half later.

SURVIVED BY WIFE AND 4 CHILDREN

Albert H. Bourgoin, 38, of Edmundston, was drowned Saturday afternoon while attempting to cross the Green River, a few yards from the Edmundston hydro electric station.

About 5 p. m., Bourgoin and Paul Sirols, also of Edmundston, decided to cross in a canoe, with the idea of hunting in the woods on the other side. In the middle of the river, the canoe upset and both occupants were thrown in the icy water. Sirols succeeded in reaching the shore but Bourgoin disappeared before any attempt could be made to save him. His body was recovered an hour and a half later a few feet from the scene of the tragedy. His feet and hands were solidly caught in a fishing net.

Bourgoin is survived by his wife and four children.

CHANGES IN PROVINCIAL POLICE RANKS

CONSTABLE ALLAIN TO MONCTON

Fredericton, 18. - Changes affecting members of the Provincial Police of the Moncton, Bathurst, Fredericton and Edmundston districts were announced Monday, by Brigadier-General F. W. Hill, commissioner. The transfers are to take effect immediately and are to be completed not later than Friday, Nov. 20.

Amongst the changes, we notice Constable E. Allain who is transferred from Edmundston to Moncton, Constable A. D. Pelletier, from Bouctouche to Shediac, and Constable J. H. Pettigrew, from Campbellton to Moncton.

Senior Constable Lacey, for the last two years in command of the Moncton detachment, will now have charge in Campbellton.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL SUPPORT

It would be indeed regrettable if the Vocational Schools were obliged to curtail operations on account of the situation which has followed the withdrawal of federal support. As the matter stands today, if vocational education is continued in the same measure as it has been in the recent past, the amount hitherto coming from the federal sources will have to be made up either from the provincial treasury, or by local municipalities, until such time as the Federal Government implements legislation passed at the last session of Parliament, providing a restoration of the Dominion grant.

The difficulty lies in the fact that the provincial authorities have ruled that after January 1, the contribution from the province for teachers' salaries will be reduced from sixty to thirty per cent, and that for equipment, amounting to fifty per cent, of the total cost, will be dropped altogether.

It has been questioned whether the provincial authorities can cumularily drop or reduce these payments. The Vocational Education Act, 1923, specially states in Sections 15 and 16, that schools established under the Act - as long as they are approved by the Board of Education, shall receive provincial grants as follows:

"In respect to expenditures for salaries of vocational directors and teachers, approved by the Vocational Board to the extent of fifty per cent."


"In respect to expenditures for vocational school equipment approved by the Vocational Board to the extent of fifty per cent."

The language in these sections is clear. It therefore seems that, regardless of the effect of the federal grant to provinces, the provincial government is obliged by law to continue in full its payments to local boards until such time as the schools in question fail to gain the approval of the Board of Education, or until the Act authorizing the payments is amended by the Legislature.

Meantime it is to be hoped that some arrangement will be effected which will remove the possibility of the vocational schools being hindered in the carrying out of a very necessary work.
