Popular Sympathy.
As the English-speaking public is learning of the horrors suffered by the 6000 men of 12 middle European nationalities until even

stolid endurance could bear no more, popular sympathy is coming to the support of the strikers in a way never before manifest in American industrial history.

Great public subscriptions for the support of the strikers are being raised. Stores, restaurants, even banks are lending a silent support.

Hoffstot's Yes.
Hoffstot's one word "yes" could end all this, 'tis true. Hoffstot is along this New England coast, watching his white boat cleave through green waves.

It was only a day from the foul staterooms of Atlantic liners to the noisome hovels waiting them at the company town.

Even the funerals of riot victims did not stop the work of throwing families and furniture out into the streets. More than forty families are being kicked out now, and are finding temporary refuge in McKees Rocks, where some noble women are helping them keep together.

Yellow cards bearing the words "No Trespassing" decorate more than half the houses in "Hunkertown."

Then they woke to their rights and struck. Some people said they riot. But there is a difference between being run down by a riot and the entrance to a riot.

Meanwhile there are 6,000 men and as many women and children in starvation here, and their hunger only has kindled them into action.
