## The Ring

In the trip was Frank Moran, the Pittsburgh heavyweight, who declared he is anxious to fight his way up to a match with "Jack" Johnson, the champion heavyweight. He fought six times in London and Paris and said he did not have trouble with any of his antagonists.

His principal fight was with "Fred" Storebreck, the South African heavyweight, champion, whom he said he bested in eleven rounds. He said he is anxious for a match with "Al" Plazer. He does not intend to fight any of the negro aspirants for the championship if he can avoid it, he said. The two other fighters were "Mike" Glover of Boston and Frank Loughery of Philadelphia. Mr. Lippe said the three men were suffering with homesickness and anxious to return to this side.

The record of 1 m. 54 3/5 s. for the same distance by Eli Parsons of Yale was made in a relay event from a flying start.

Chicago, Feb. 22.—Duke Kahanamoku and Vincent Genoves, Hawaiian aspirants for places on the American Olympic swimming team, stopped here on their way to Wabash, where they will compete in the 20 and 500 yard swims of the Pittsburg clubs.

Neither man has had any experience in tank swimming or in fresh water work, but both hold records for salt water courses.

When Ira Davenport of Chicago University won the Western Conference quarter and half mile championship in Minneapolis last June in 49 2/5 and 1 m. 56 3/5 s. respectively, the man who made him extend himself to the limit was little Lester Bermond of the University of Missouri. Now the two are in the same boat, out in Kansas City that Dr. J. A. Reilly, athletic director of the Kansas City A. C. is trying to arrange a special half mile race between Bermond and Mel Sheppard. It is to be a feature of the big K. C. A. indoor meet on April 6.

Speaking about Ira Davenport, his performances in the last two Western Conference meets in the quarter and half mile events, when placed together, make very impressive records. In the quarter he did 48 4/5 seconds in 1910 and 49 2/5 seconds in 1911, while in the half mile his performances were identical each year—1 minute 56 3/5 seconds.

Nobody can make the distance king quit when he is in shape.

Alvah Meyer strikes such speed in the last 20 yards of a 100 yard race that Lawson Robertson, his trainer, thinks that he may be able to carry it through for 120 yards. If he can, Robertson is looking for the displacement of Bernie Welfers' American record of 11 4/5 for 120 yards and the equalling of Reggie Walker's 11 2/5 s.
