INTERSCHOLASTIC SPORTS; ROTHESAY WON THE TROPHY

For the first time in four years, Rothersey Collegiate School won the interscholastic track sports on Saturday afternoon in Rothersey, before a large crowd of spectators, very many going out from the city. There were three teams entered, Rothersey School, who made 41 points; St. John High School, who made 35, and Moncton Abbeville School who made 14.

The weather was ideal for sports and the cinder track in excellent condition for good fast time. One record, 24 3/4 sec. for the 120 yds. established by F. Foley, St. John, in 1912, was smashed by Barracough, St. John, by 1-5 sec. Good time was made in all the events and in some cases the record was nearly equalled. The highest scoring men were Nichols (R.) 16; Barracough (St. J.) 15; Ratchford (R.) 11; Taylor (St. J.) 7.
