

COURT OF APPEAL GIVES JUDGMENT IN SEVERAL CASES

Two More Cases Argued Yesterday, After Which Court Adjourned to Friday Next.

Frederick, June 6.—Judgments were given in several important cases, Sir Douglas Hazen and Justices White and Grimmer being present. In John H. Lee vs. Walter Arthur and Agnes Arthur, the chief justice read the judgment of Chief Justice McKewen with which he and Judge Chandler concurred; decrease varied. In Lee vs. Logan there was a similar decision.

Sir Douglas Hazen delivered the judgment in the case of the King vs. Vroom, ex parte Crawford, refusing the charter to the corporation of the Charlotte county magistrate by which a St. Stephen drugist was found guilty of a violation under the prohibition act for the sale of Jamaica ginger, which when analyzed was shown to contain about fifty per cent. of alcohol.

In the matter of Mary Elizabeth Kelly, oral judgments were given by the chief justice and other members of the court allowing the appeal with costs both to the appeal court and in the probate court against Rev. W. Vachey of Bathurst. After judgments were delivered orally by the counsel, G. H. V. Belyea, K. C. for respondent (J. S. Gibson & Co., Ltd.) and Ralph St. J. Frenze for the appellant (Herman A. Myers) was heard in the case of Myers vs. Gibson, in which a verdict was rendered for the plaintiff for \$333 in the last Kings county circuit before Judge Crockett sitting with a jury. Counsel for Myers moved to increase the verdict covering some merchandise the delivery of which was in dispute at trial and not allowed on trial. Court considers.

POLICE COURT CASES YESTERDAY

In the police court yesterday Ralph Corning was remanded on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences from Lloyd Anthony of Red Head, it being claimed that defendant sold a cow which he did not own to Mr. Anthony. He is also charged with entering John Glynn's barn and stealing a wagon.

A case against Wallace Stevens for having liquor in his possession illegally was further postponed. The case against Joseph Bloom, charged with assaulting Jane and Jacob Fisher, was postponed until Monday.

Four men arrested on May 31st for being drunk were fined \$3 each. Arson Marcus, an Austrian charged with not reporting to the police, was again remanded.

Mrs. Ralibourne, a Cleveland was before the court on the charge of bigamy and the case was further postponed.

A serious case against Edgar Banks the prisoner was remanded.

PARLIAMENT DISCUSSES BILL TO CREATE PURCHASING COM.

The Commission is to Carry on the Work Carried on by the War Purchasing Committee and Purchase All Government Supplies.

Ottawa, June 6.—Practically the whole day in the House was spent on discussion of a bill to create a purchasing commission. The commission is to continue the work carried on by the war purchasing commission and is to purchase all government supplies. There was somewhat extended criticism of the bill.

Mr. Lomax, who moved the six months' hold, objected to men not responsible to parliament being given the power to expend public money. There was always a possibility that a commission might make extravagant expenditures or corrupt bargains.

Sir Robert Borden on the other hand, held that the war purchasing commission had saved a large sum of money to the Dominion. The commission would assist in eliminating political influence and patronage.

The motion for six months' hold was defeated by 66 to 16—a government majority of 87. John Best, J. A. Maharg and Dr. Michael Clark voted with the opposition.

In explaining the bill to the House, Hon. Mr. Rowell said it provided for the purchasing for all departments of the government by this single commission. It was felt that it supplies for all departments were purchased by a single body in large quantities, better prices would be obtained. Purchasing had now become a science.

AMERICAN SENATE BREAKS INTO THE IRISH QUESTION Passes a Resolution Urging the Peace Conference to Hear the Irish Delegates, and Also Express Sympathy With Aspirations of the Irish People.

Washington, June 6.—A resolution by Senator Borah, asking the American peace delegates at Paris to secure a hearing before the peace conference for the Irish delegates, sponsored by Edward de Valera, provisional president of the Irish Republic, was adopted today by the Senate, sixty to zero.

An amendment by Senator Walsh, of Massachusetts, that the Senate also "express sympathy with the aspirations of the Irish people for a government of its own people" was adopted without a roll call.

The original position of the peace conference, Senator Lodge said, "against interfering with internal affairs of other nations, might have caused objections to the Walsh amendment."

She spoke of the fields for study for the year, India, China, Korea, near East, Africa, and the study book, "A Crusade of Compassion for the Healing of the Nations," and called special attention to the poster, "God with an Only Son, and He was a Missionary and a Physician."

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PRESBYTERIANS HAVE CLASH AT GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Heated Words That Threaten to Disrupt Assembly Break Forth Over "Term of Elders."

Hamilton, Ont., June 6.—An overture presented to the Presbyterian General Assembly, this afternoon, by Rev. J. B. Paulin, of Rosedale Presbyterian Church, at Toronto, asking that permission be granted congregations, if by them judged expedient, to elect elders for a five-year term instead of for life, caused a lively discussion and threatened at times to disrupt the meeting.

The result of the vote to lay the resolutions on the table was 119 in favor and 120 against. The matter will be further discussed tomorrow. The resolution also provided that the elders serving in a congregation may be re-elected at the end of any such period, and that the decision to adopt the time limit of service by any congregation shall be made by a vote of the members called for that purpose.
