St. Luke's church offering on Easter Sunday was: St. Luke's parish church, \$1,192.66; St. Clement's. Millidgeville, \$2,21; total, \$1,225.57. This is regarded as probably the largest collection taken in any Protestant church in St. John. About a month ago the rector, Rev. R. P. McKim, addressing his congregation, gave a statement of the church finances and asked them for a special collection on Easter Sunday and Charles Sunday. He named \$1,000 and when the contributions of the day were totalled they were found to amount to \$999.73. Since then the collection at St.Clement's a church, checks and other east contributions from a few of the leading members of the church have made the amount far in excess of the sum asked for by the rector, or \$1,225.57 in all. The membership of the church is not wealthy as a whole and the excellent response to the rector's call is looked upon as a tribute to the esteem in which his congregation held-him.

The financial statement showed total rectipts \$2,180.93 and expenditures \$1,296, a substantial balance of \$884.93. The total collections for Easter Sunday amounted to \$25.21, of which \$197.96 is for missions.




