

AUTO BANDITS AT LONDON Automobile bandits staged a drama-tic coup at the Grand Trunk Railway station at London Saturday evening, when they carried off the strong box of the Canadian Express Company, while they covered the express car crew, several railwaymen and a num-ber of other people with revolvers. The box contained \$800, mostly Grand Trunk Railway funds, collected on the London, Huron & Bruce.
