MACHINERY PRICES MAY NOT GO DOWN

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for the week ending February 24, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

There has been no continuation of the movement that seemed to be getting under way a few days ago toward lower prices in certain lines of machine tools and steel goods.

The steel market belongs to the buyer just now and he is taking advantage of the situation and buying more to his liking than he has been able to do for a good many months past.

The scrap metal market remains as it has been for weeks past, viz., as near defunct as it can get. There is such a tremendous surplus of copper on the U. S. market that it may be some time before there is recovery in price.
