Anything that looks like a fair tonnage is pretty well carted around before the placing takes place and as a result there are departures more or less marked from quoted prices. The fact that little money is made on many of these sales is set over against the pleasing reality that it allows the warehouses to liquidate their stock and get in shape to buy to the best advantage whenever the turn in the market may come.
